### Nabs Wood memorial event 2025

The unveiling of a tribute to Nabs Wood - the preservation and progression of the Wood, and the Memorial of the 1838 Pit Disaster

Nabs Wood Moorend Lane, Silkstone Common is the site of the horrendous pit disaster on 4th July 1838, where 26 children aged 7 to 17 years working in the mine became trapped, and drowned. To mark 150 years since the disaster a plaque and memorial was erected to remember the loss of young lives from Silkstone Parish in 2008. The memorial depicts two children at work underground.



Nabs Wood Memorial

The disaster shocked the nation, including the newly enthroned young Queen Victoria, which led to a bill being put through Parliament - the *Mines Act-Protection for child miners 1842*. This was the beginning of significant changes for children and women working down the mines.

Nabs Wood Woodland Warden Stewart Walton, who lives in Silkstone Common, is passionate about the Wood, and has invested his time and skills in updating and preserving the Wood for, not only present and future generations of the Parish, but also visitors who can learn about the events of 1838, and the significant change in the law of the time.

Stewart, supported by the owners of Nabs Wood *The Woodlands Trust*, and a number of supporters/partners, James Jeeson the Woodlands Trust area ranger, and the Farmer whose field backs onto the Nabs Wood site, have pulled together since August 2024 and made the wood and memorial accessible and safe to visit once more. Steps have been upgraded with handrails, benches refurbished, trees have been felled to open up the canopy, drains have been cleared, the bridge over the stream has been refurbished alongside the memorial and notice board.

Stewart has made signs directing folk to where the 'Day Hole' for the Huskar mine was positioned (used for ventilation and in addition where the children drowned and were removed from at this point). Deer, foxes and badgers are visiting Nabs Wood, as their footprints have been seen in the mud of the stream that runs through the Wood.



### **Nabs Wood refurbished**

Work on the feed to the stream is being carried out due to the amount of debris and rubbish that has accumulated over the years, with help from Barnsley Council.

Stewart informed me that 'further work is planned for the coming months to make this a place for contemplation and just sit and enjoy, and maybe share a prayer for the children'.

There has also been a specific donation to *The Woodland Trust* made by an anonymous lady from York, who left a dowry, to improve Nabs Wood.

Stewart informed me that he was contacted by a Nick Smith living in Guernsey, who has written a play about the Pit disaster in Silkstone Common called 'The Silkstone Scar'.

Nick and Pippa (daughter) researched the terrible events of the Huskar pit disaster, and they used Kate Rusby's song, 'Halt the Wagons' (from her 2019 album *Philosophers, Poets & Kings*), as their opening song as well as 5 tunes

written by the musical director Peter Smith.

Stewart and his wife were invited to see the play at the Beau Sejour Theatre in Amherst 7<sup>th</sup> July 2025. At the end of the performance Nick and his daughter Pippa presented Stewart with a stainless-steel plaque to commemorate the loss of the young lives. The plaque states:

'Presented on behalf of the children of Music Box in Guernsey to commemorate the 26 children lost in the Huskar Pit disaster July 4<sup>th</sup> 1838 - June 7<sup>th</sup> 2025'

The plaque is placed on an oak plinth near to the Day Hole site, and was unveiled at the 28<sup>th</sup> July event in Nabs Wood by our own Jim Travis (British Empire Medal for services to the community). Nick and Pippa Smith from Guernsey attended the event, and Jane Raistrick from the Silkstone Heritage group attended the event. Jane is a descendent of two of the children who lost their lives in the disaster.

The National Union of Mineworkers also attended on behalf of the miners from Barnsley and brought a banner to the event to represent all miners. As part of their commitment to the Huskar Pit disaster the NUM headquarters have a display to share the story about the 26 children who lost their lives.



**Guernsey Plaque**

Approximately 50 people attended the event on 28th July 2025, witnessing the unveiling of the plaque, and listening to songs from Kate Rusby 'Halt the Wagons' and Sam Fender 'Remember My Name'.

In conclusion Stewart shared that he not only wanted to raise the profile of Nabs Wood, but also he was doing it for 'the kids' (who lost their lives) and 'to keep the

story passed on through the schools and to our children, and continue to keep this lovely wood and memorial maintained'.

Stewart hopes that the story of the disaster continues to be shared in our local schools, as part of our heritage.

I would like to thank Stewart for his investment and commitment to Nabs Wood, and spending time to share his story, so far.

Have you visited Nabs Wood? Do you know the story of the disaster?



### **The Wonderfully Made event 2025**

Our superb craft fair Wonderfully Made in Yorkshire will be held this year on 31st October from 10am to 7pm and 1st November and 2nd November from 10am to 4pm. Wonderfully Made was first started by the glass designer Rachel Poole following her work on the memorial window depicting the Huskar disaster.

Organisation of the event was taken over by members of the parochial Church Council, known as the PCC (not to be confused with the Parish Council). The current organisers are PCC members and stallholders, and this year the Women's Institute will again be providing the refreshments. Wonderfully Made has to fit around our normal Church services and also Remembrance Sunday, so this year it is slightly early.

It is a difficult balancing act getting the right mix of stalls and making sure that we have some new faces among the old favourites. Our stallholders this year are another varied group, we have jewellery, cards, knitwear, toiletries, bags, honey, photos, pottery, artwork, calligraphy, woodwork and, as always, some beautiful glassware.

We do get more applicants than there are places, and so some applicants have to be turned away. None of us like this part of the process! The money raised is an essential part of the Church fundraising, and if there is anyone who would like to help, or has any other fundraising ideas we would like to hear from you. The Church does not receive any central funding and relies on this sort of event, and donations, to stay open.

Even if you are not familiar with the Church Wonderfully Made is a great opportunity to view the Church interior and to see the Huskar Window. The quirkiness produced by using an old church in this way is one of Wonderfully Made's distinguishing features, and it is of course the ideal event to start your Christmas shopping!

The stall holders are now hard at work making items for the fair and the entry fee has again been kept at £1 (children free). We very much hope that this year's event will be another success and look forward to welcoming you all again.

### Silkstone War Memorial

Fund raising began in 1919 to provide Silkstone with its memorial to honour the fallen of the Great War, and it was unveiled on 8th Oct 1922 at a ceremony attended by military officers, exservicemen, religious figures, the village band and hundreds more who attended to pay their respects.

A number of fundraising events including garden parties, teas and socials, whist drives and concerts, house to house collections and donations from local businesses and dignitaries had raised the necessary funds.

The total cost of providing the memorial was £396 15s 3d which included £347 16s to local contractor Albert Edward Gelder to supply and erect the memorial. There was a deficit of about £30 which was paid into the funds by JE Cowcill.

The memorial was situated on the corner of the churchyard, and built into the old church walls opposite the road to Cawthorne.



For almost 50 years Armistice Day would be commemorated on the roadside, and

the small number of vehicles in the early days, would wait until the service was finished. Apart from regular cleaning and the letters being re-done in 1950, the war memorial remained untouched. However, in the late 1960s the tight bend at the top of Church Hill was becoming a problem as traffic increased, particularly after the motorway was built, and the memorial stones were damaged more than once by large lorries trying to navigate the tight bend.





In 1968 a decision was made to re-site the memorial to prevent further damage. This coincided with a scheme

to improve the road layout which would have meant moving it anyway. After considering a location on the grass in front of the bungalows opposite the Ring 'O Bells, a site in Martin Croft was chosen and the memorial was moved in January 1972 and re-dedicated in a ceremony held on 3rd Sept 1972. The cost of moving the memorial, paid for Barnsley Council was around £2,000. Local artist Ashley Jackson designed the programme cover for the ceremony.

The move and the re-dedication service was organised by the Royal British Legion with help from its newly formed women's section. Roses, donated by Horsfield's Nursery were planted on both sides of the memorial.



If the Parish Council thought that moving the memorial would prevent further damage, they were sadly wrong. In December 1977 the cross was damaged again and the devastation was far worse than that caused by lorries knocking the plinths. This time children using the cross for a rope swing caused the cross to collapse and break into pieces. Serious concerns were raised as to whether it could be repaired.



Thanks to the Royal British Legion, the cross was repaired, but it had to be shortened from 11 feet to 8 feet



This November, despite its knocks and damage it has survived, and Silkstone War Memorial will be the centre of the Armistice Day parade and service for the 104th year

### **Dead Hedges**

Dead Hedges are important for people, wildlife and the environment

You may recall that CARE has developed a biodiversity action plan, one of the actions is to build Dead Hedges in our woodland areas - you may have seen them in Conroyd Wood and Orchard Wood?

We have erected these to help preserve ground flora from being eroded by footfall. They also provide an additional wildlife corridor for lots of species. At least 20% of all woodland species rely on deadwood as part of their wildlife cycle.





Dead hedges provide hiding places, shelter and habitats for all sorts of creatures. As it rots down, the nutrients are recycled back into the earth below, meaning the "waste" needn't go into bins or bonfires.

They create a habitat for insects and beetles as well as a rich feeding ground for small mammals such as hedgehogs and birds.

### **Insect of the Season - Hawthorn Shieldbug**

Over the next few weeks many insect species will be starting to prepare for the challenges of winter. The adults of some species die off in late summer or autumn, having laid eggs in a suitable habitat to ensure a new generation next spring.

It's a good time to spot the red and green Hawthorn Shieldbug (Acanthosoma haemorrhoidale). This is our largest shieldbug, It can be seen in gardens, parks and woodlands, feeding on hawthorn, rowan and whitebeam.





### Silkstone Parish Walks

Silkstone to Banks Hall





### Walk Description

- A. The walk starts and finishes at Silkstone Church. From the church take the road towards Cawthorne and immediately turn left onto Bull Haw Lane. After 50 metres walk straight ahead up the farm track, continue for 200 metres then turn right.
- B. At the end go over the stile on the left. Keep left for 100 metres then bear right across the field to Banks Bottom Dyke.
- C. Go over a stile and footbridge and follow the footpath to the next stile. Turn right to the top of the field then turn left immediately before the next stile. Walk along the south side of Banks Hall and follow the footpath to South Lane
- D. Turn left and after a few hundred metres take the footpath on the left. Turn right along the track for 20 metres then go over the stile on the left down the field side to a footbridge again across Banks Bottom Dyke.
- E. Follow the footpath up through the wood and turn right onto Whin Moor Lane. Take the footpath right along Green Lane, then left at Cooper Lane and left again at next footpath back to Whin Moor Lane. This route is included so that you go through an excellent original wild meadow area.
- F. Continue straight across the lane on the footpath which rises to a tree line and then drops down to another lane which leads to Bull Haw Farm from the A628 Penistone Road.
- G. Go straight across the lane to a stone stile and turn right. At the bend turn right through the wood, eventually bearing left to the stile in the field corner and continue keeping the wood close on your left and fenced field on the right.
- H. Go on past the houses on the right, over a footbridge, bearing right onto High Street in Silkstone. Turn left back to Silkstone Church.

### **General Information**

Approx 2 1/4 miles. Some sections can have wet, muddy or uneven ground and weather conditions can vary. Choose appropriate footwear and clothing.

### **Additional Information**

- A The houses on the left of Bull Haw Lane, called Pack Horse Green, are built on the site of Pack Horse Farm which some older inhabitants of Silkstone still remember. As the name suggests, it was a staging post for the pack horses carrying salt from Cheshire a couple of centuries ago.
- B Just before reaching Banks Bottom Dyke there used to be an old railway track which took coal from Bank Bottom mine to join the track from Silkstone. The main track then continued down to Cawthorne Basin where there was a loading wharf for the canal system.
  - A couple of Herons are sometimes to be seen feeding in the dike. Herons are usually found on large lakes or wetland areas but sometimes visit streams and dikes, particularly in the winter during harsh weather when lakes are frozen.
- C Banks Hall was within the Cannon Hall estate which belonged to the Spencer-Stanhope family and was last occupied by Mrs Spencer-Stanhope. It was known as a Dower House, which is a term used for a residence occupied by a widow of the estate. In later years it has been used as a Hostel and home for the elderly.
- G Looking right from this part of the route is Noblethorpe Hall which was once owned by the Clark family who owned many of the mines around Silkstone.

The field, as you approach the houses, was formerly known as Turner's field and was the venue of the Silkstone Feast Celebrations. A stage was erected, and in addition to the church choir there would be a band and other entertainments.


### Be a Saint for All Saints'

### **Dear Friends**

The last time I wrote an article for the magazine I informed you about the repairs and alterations needed to the church building. These repairs will cost in excess of £60,000. One of the important issues facing us is the need to make provision for an extra fire exit. This will mean reopening a long blocked up door on the north side of the church. Well over a century ago health and safety rules were largely unknown. The challenge is to make the church a safe space for our visitors to worship services, weddings, baptisms and funerals. We also have to consider the very many who come to concerts and events such as the annual craft fair. Wonderfully Made in Yorkshire.

As you can imagine the high point of the church, the tower, is subject to the year round wear and tear caused by exposure to the elements. The need goes largely unnoticed to the naked eye, but work needs to be done to secure the pinnacles and the crown of the tower for future generations. What would Silkstone Parish be without the sight of the church tower flying the flag and lit up during the Christmas season as you turn the corner at the top of Cone Lane? We need to ensure its survival for present and future generations.

One of the areas which needs attention is the beautiful sanctuary floor laid out with Victorian encaustic tiles. These are in urgent need of repair and restoration



which will secure them for another one hundred and fifty years and more.

So, I suppose I should just cut the chase in true Yorkshire style and ask you for your support. It's no good 'beating around the bush'. So here is the big ask from the Vicar – we urgently need your financial help. We will, of course, apply to any grant funding bodies and charities which may be able to help but the maintenance and repair of parish churches falls largely upon the congregations and communities in which they are set. If I had a pound for every time someone has pointed out that the Church of England is one of the richest institutions in the world, I would be able to pay for the repairs outright, but it doesn't quite work that way.

So, we are launching our appeal called, 'Be a Saint for All Saints' and kindly ask for your financial help to secure the church building for the years to come.

On our Facebook page we will be launching a Justgiving event, so please look out for that. We also have a scheme where you can sponsor a church tower pinnacle or a set of Sanctuary tiles. Each sponsor receives a signed certificate from the Vicar, the perfect gift for a loved one who has everything...and don't forget, Christmas is coming!

### **Gardening with Matt B**

Continuing our series on garden design, having now gathered our ideas and initial sketches, we look at the first stage of translating this into the garden.

We start by assessing; Shade, Moisture, Light, Wind, these factors guide our horticulture and overall design. Firstly, we must observe and note the garden, ideally for a period of time, to consider some main influencing factors;

Light – Light is fundamental to plants and design. Initially we're talking about full sun and full shade. Translating this into your design might mean the difference between placing a seating area in a lovely sunny place or a shady corner (both equally valid!). Light levels, of course, greatly affect plants too and will drive our plant choice later.

One you know your light we can consider this in the design e.g. timing. If you only use the garden in the evening, placing a seating spot in the last evening light is a great option. Alternatively, there a varying degrees of light which can be used as opportunities e.g. placing a tree which likes full sun, creates shade to underplant with shade preferent species.

First observe the light in your garden and we can then use this information to develop and inform the design.



Soil, Moisture & Topography – Soil & Moisture are critical to design, though perhaps more of planting design if you are comfortable installing drainage. Plants, as anything living, need water, and identifying areas of your garden which are more moisture retentive can assist in plant choice. Moisture is linked to soil type, topography and light, e.g. a damp shady corner. However, this is not always the case and you can enhance or work with your space to develop moisture microclimates.

It is always a good idea to work with your garden in reference to moisture, as it is often hard to change fundamentally. You can work with your existing ground level and soil type, creating areas of damper and drier ground.

Create a small map of your garden, noting damper areas, raised areas and also assess the soil across the garden, noting any changes.



Wind & Temperature – Wind is a big consideration in design. A patio sitting in a wind tunnel isn't much fun, though very still areas can also be detrimental. Understanding how wind moves through your garden is fundamental to placing your 'mass'.

Wind also affects temperature and can quickly chill plants well below their tolerable range, or can cause early flowerers to quickly lose their colour.

Observe how wind moves through your garden, and we can develop this into the design to create comfortable spaces.

Autumn is a great season for observation as we often have both settled and changeable conditions through the months, plus (in my opinion), some of the best light of the year. So perhaps pop a notebook on a window and spend a few moments each week observing and understanding your garden. Then we can look at those 'masses and voids' combined with your 'site assessment' to develop the features of your garden.

For more information on assessing and working with your prevailing conditions, why not take a look at our recent RHS Wentworth Feature Garden, which was aimed at understanding and then working with your space, rather than fighting against it.






