Walking in Silkstone Parish – a Silkstone CARE group project

For those who don't know, CARE stands for Community Action in the Rural Environment. The CARE group is a team of local people who give their time across both villages keeping the area clean and tidy, planting bulbs, flowers, shrubs and trees, helping conserve nature. CARE is more than this though and we are currently working on a new project about promoting local walks and places of interest and we need your help so read on to find out more...

Silkstone Parish is truly blessed with some beautiful countryside. We have a lot of lovely walks within the parish and lots of interesting things to see along our footpaths. Lots of people already enjoy the walks but helping others enjoy the scenery, history and nature found in the parish is something the CARE group is keen to include in its work. Part of this project is to create a new Silkstone Parish boundary walk similar to those around Thurgoland, Oxspring and other local parishes.

Besides the new boundary walk, this project should help facilitate enjoyment of our beautiful countryside and encourage us to all be a little more healthy.

This fits with a number of Barnsley MBC goals and is also something that schools and community groups might wish to help with or be involved. So far, CARE has mapped out a boundary walk with step-by-step instructions. We have compiled a list of existing documented walks around the parish so as to preserve the good work of others. We are working towards a plan to make these and other useful resources online and available in paper form at key places in the parish and encourage as many people as possible to take advantage of what is already on our doorstep.

In the next few months, what we want to do and what we would like some help with is...

- Make a list of all the points of interest in the parish. These might be in any form, natural, historical, industrial etc. For example there are many remnants of industry in the area that are near walks that have an interesting history. The aim is to allow anyone enjoying a walk on the path to find a little more.
- Put simple low key way markers around the parish boundary walk (and possibly other parish walks). These would like similar to those marking other local boundary walks,
- Produce leaflets and maps in paper and online that tell everyone about the walks and points of interest. Make these available in cafe's, pubs and businesses in the parishInvolve groups and volunteers in the community in the project

Asian Hornet - a real threat to our natural environment.

Vespa velutina, the yellow legged hornet, commonly known as the Asian hornet, is native to Asia and was confirmed for the first time in Lot-et-Garonne in the South West of France in 2004. It was thought to have been imported in a consignment of pottery from China and it quickly established and spread to many regions of France. As of December 2022, Asian hornet is established in Spain, Belgium, Netherlands, Portugal, Italy, Switzerland, Germany and Jersey. The hornet preys on a wide range of insects including honeybees, Apis mellifera and disrupts the ecological role they provide. It has also altered the biodiversity in regions of France where it is present and can be a health risk to those who have allergies to hornet or wasp stings.

In 2016, the Asian hornet was discovered in the UK for the first time, in Tetbury. After 10 days of intensive searching, the nest was found and later destroyed. In subsequent years there have been further sightings with action taken to find and destroy nests. As of January 2023, genetic analysis has shown that there is no evidence for an established population of Asian hornets in the UK and all hornets found have been likely to be from the European population rather than a new incursion from Asia.

Appearance and biology of the Asian hornet

The Asian hornet is smaller than our native hornet, with adult workers measuring from 25mm in length and queens measuring 30mm. The abdomen is mostly black except for the fourth abdominal segment which has a yellow band. It has characteristically yellow legs which accounts for why it is often called the yellow legged hornet and its face is orange with two brownish red compound eyes.



Spring

After hibernation in spring, the queen, usually measuring up to 3 cm, will emerge and seek out an appropriate sugary food source in order to build up energy to commence building a small embryonic nest. During construction of the nest, she is alone and vulnerable, but she will rapidly begin laying eggs to produce the future workforce. As the colony and nest size increases, a larger nest is either established around the embryonic nest or they relocate and build elsewhere.

Summer

During the summer, a single colony, on average, produces 6000 individuals in one season. From July onwards, Asian hornet predation on honeybee colonies will begin and increase until the end of November and hornets can be seen hovering outside a hive entrance, waiting for returning foragers. This is the characteristic "hawking" behaviour. When they catch a returning bee, they will take it away and feed off of the protein rich thorax; the brood requires animal proteins which are transformed into flesh pellets and then offered to the larvae.

Autumn

During autumn, the nest's priorities shift from foraging and nest expansion to producing on average 350 potential gynes (queens) and male hornets for mating, however, of these potential queens, only a small amount will successfully mate and make it through winter. After the mating period, the newly fertilised queens will leave the nest and find somewhere suitable to over-winter, while the old queen will die, leaving the nest to dwindle and die off. The following spring, the founding queen will begin building her new colony and the process begins again.



In light of the Asian hornet finding in the UK in September 2016, it is imperative that you make sure you know how to recognise and can distinguish them from our native hornet, Vespa crabro – a very helpful poster is available to help you:

If you think you have seen an Asian hornet, please notify the Great British Non Native Species Secretariat (NNSS) immediately. In the first instance sightings should be reported through the free Asian Hornet Watch App, available for Android and iPhone. If you are unsure please contact the Barnsley Bee Keeping Association for help. Please do not attempt to destroy a nest yourself as the hornets could attack and sting en masse if they are threatened.

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CARE Looking Back : Looking Forward In Numbers

Our CARE volunteers continue to be very active in both villages. We had a great 2023 and this year is set to be another busy one. We thought we would provide our update using numbers, we hope you find it interesting.

Looking Back at 2023

Starting with the most amazing statistic - our volunteers carried out over **1000** volunteer hours during 2022/23.

We worked extensively in Orchard Wood in Silkstone Common - 8 new steps constructed, 1 handrail installed, 134 metres of wooden footpath edging, held in place with 140 wooden stakes, ready to hold 36 tons of road shavings (which all had to be moved from where it was dropped by the delivery truck).

Ready for spring we planted over 500 bulbs and we planted on 360 plug plants bringing them on ready for summer bedding. Plus we planted a further 100 mature bedding plants.

We held 4 fundraising events, 2022 Christmas Fayre £63, Car Boot Sale £154, 2023 Summer Fayre £330 and 2023 Christmas Fayre £144 - thank you to residents who supported our efforts and joined in our games.

Plus our usual regular work sessions and litter picking. Sounds exhausting but all great fun made possible by a relatively small number of volunteers from across both villages.

Looking Forward to 2024

We have been hugely successful with a number of grants, getting us into a great shape to tackle some additional larger projects this year.

We still have funds remaining to complete the footpath in Orchard Wood.

We have received £700 from Penistone Ward Alliance, this is specifically to refresh the garden area on the right hand side, at the bottom of the hill near the Church in Silkstone. We will be putting down weed matting and refreshing the stones. We want this area to be really impressive as you drive into Silkstone.

We have received £600 in grants for work on Silkstone Station. This will help finance new planting, bark etc. We will continue to work with the Men in Sheds team and may acquire a further planter.

You may recall that watering plants last year was a challenge, it was for us too. We want to move away from relying on bedding plants for summer colour and aim to introduce more sustainable planting across both villages. We want the balance to be a mix between colourful bedding with flowering shrubs. We were successful in receiving a grant of $\pounds1000$ towards new plants for this project. This is a great start for us and we hope that you enjoy the result.

The above together with a huge grant of $\pounds 1680$ from the Co-op Community Fund (this is a mix of a grant and local shoppers selecting CARE as their preferred Community Group), we are in good shape to have a very positive impact on our villages.

We will be purchasing some new equipment and new high-viz vests - please do stop for a chat when you see our volunteers out and about, it really does mean a lot when we get feedback from local residents.

And of course, you are very welcome to join us, please contact us if you are interested in contributing to our work.



Silkstone & Silkstone Common Police Houses Of The Past

Silkstone's first policeman arrived in the village to begin his duties on 1st January 1857. His name was Joseph Stead who had been sworn into the newly formed West Riding Constabulary in December 1856.

Prior to the formation of an organised police force, law and order in rural areas such as Silkstone was administered by the village or parish constable, a person appointed annually by the local judiciary. He had many administrative duties in addition to being responsible for the village stocks and the village lock-up (prison cell), and was expected to punish poachers, drunks, vagabonds, beggars etc. It was also his duty to deliver to Court in Barnsley, any person detained in the village lock-up awaiting trial.

The lock-up was located in Silkstone's first police house – part of Beckside Cottage (near The Ring O' Bells next to the Waggon Road). Built in 1751, this was originally three separate cottages, and the police house was in the house closest to the main road. The prison bars of the lock-up's outside window still exist in the cottage to this day.

Lock-ups generally became obsolete with the formation of the police forces and the construction of police stations with proper cells in the late 19th century. In 1891 the cottages were known as 'Police Row' and in 1901 PC James Morphet became the last serving policeman to live there when it was known as 'Police Yard'. By 1902 the property was no longer used as the village police house.

In 1915, it was already being called 'The Old Police House' and by 1939 Police Row had been re-named Beckside Cottages. The photograph below was taken in 1983 and apart from the dormer windows it remained pretty much unchanged from the early 1900s.



When, after 150 years, the cottage in Police Row became obsolete, a new police house was needed. From 1902 onwards this was based in one of the four cottages next to the bakery on Ben Bank Road in Silkstone Common, which was then known as South Parade and South View. A sign reading 'West Riding Constabulary' was fixed above the front door to identify this cottage as being the Police House. PC EG Larmoth, in 1902, PC Spencer Hill from 1906 to 1920 and PC William Bell from 1920 to 1924 are

recorded as some of the village policemen who lived there. When PC Hill moved there in October 1906, he was photographed standing proudly outside the cottage.



South Parade / View was used as the police house from 1902 to sometime in the late 1920s / early 1930s. From at least 1933 until 1947 it was moved back to Silkstone when PC William Henry Smith lived in the bottom cottage of Eastfield View in Silkstone, which is opposite the modern day entrance to Towngate.

When Penistone Rural District Council built Viewlands in Silkstone Common in 1947, the West Riding Constabulary rented number 8 and for the next 15 years or so this became the new Police House. A police sign was placed on the front of the house, and the first policeman to occupy number 8 was PC Jim Hall who was the village policeman from 1947 to 1954. PC Les Barrell and his family moved there from Kippax in November 1954 and would remain in the Viewlands until 1963. We don't have a photo of the police house, but the photo below shows the property in the late 1960s.



'Bobby' Barrell, as he was known to all in the village, and family moved into a brand new purpose built Police House at the bottom of Manor Park, Silkstone, in 1963. Similar houses were built in other villages including Stainborough, Cawthorne and Higham. A single storey office was attached to the two storey living accommodation for use by the police officer who would report to the police station at Dodworth.

The office didn't contain a cell and was equipped with a desk with two chairs and storage cupboards for documents etc. There was a separate toilet and sink. Outside a blue police sign on a pole stood in the front garden where it was visible from the main road.

The house was built at the time of the Cold War and the potential threat of nuclear attack was very real. Because of this, it was installed with a nuclear attack warning system and a re-purposed ex World War Two hand driven air raid siren which would have been sounded in the event of imminent nuclear attack. The early warning system had to be regularly tested by the resident policeman.

The photograph below shows Les Barrell, off duty, with his family outside the front of the house in the mid to late sixties.



"Bobby" Barrell moved to 26 Manor Park in 1973, before retiring from the force in 1975. From 1973 the occupants of the police house were PC Edward Beever and his family who moved from Wilthorpe and lived there until January 1977. The photograph below was taken at the time they lived there and shows the police house as most people who were around at the time will remember it.

The police force agreed to sell the house in the late 1980s and the history of police houses / accommodation in Silkstone and Silkstone Common came to a close.

Beckside Cottage which served as the police house in the village for 150 years has been extended and redeveloped since the 1983 photo was taken but still survives as one of Silkstone's oldest houses.



The cottage on Ben Bank Road has changed very little since being used as the police house except the fanlight above the front door has been bricked up and the cottage in Eastfield View has changed little since the 1930s. The houses at Viewlands were demolished in 1986 and later replaced by modern housing. The police house at the bottom of Manor Park has been extended and re-developed over the years and now bears little resemblance to the one in the 1970s photograph.

The names of many of the men who lived in these houses have emerged during research for this article and it is intended to share some of their stories in the future. 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Recipe of the Month Leek and Potato Soup

This can be made in so many ways: The basic recipe is Vegetarian or Vegan but you can add ham or bacon to it and use nonvegan stocks .

Optional extras

- Celery (string removed and chopped)
- Onions (finely chopped)
- Garlic (peeled and chopped/smashed)
- Bacon (chopped and fried)
- Cooked Ham (chopped)



Garnish options

- Chopped chives
- Chopped fresh parsley

Method

- Wash and peel the potatoes, cut into 1 inch/2 cm cubes. Place in a large saucepan.
- 2. Remove the outer leaves from the leeks, trim the tops, slice lengthways and plunge into cold water to remove any soil/grit from the open end.
- Chop into 1 cm slices, fry in butter/oil for about 10 minutes until soft. and add to the pan.
- 4. Add the stock and any remaining ingredients (if using bacon chop and fry first, if ham chop it before adding).
- 5. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer until the potatoes are tender. Add pepper to taste.
- 6. If you wish to eat it immediately liquidise it (or use a potato masher to break up the potatoes.) Or wait until cool to liquidise/mash.

Insect of the Issue Hoverflies

There are around 280 species of hoverfly in the UK. Hoverflies are "true" flies, with just two wings. The adults are important pollinators feeding on nectar, while larvae include predators (around 40% of species eat aphids), plant feeders (herbivores) and recyclers (detritivores i.e. they eat dead plants/animals).

They are around May to September – though with global warming this may change. They range in size depending on the species from a few millimetres to 2cm.

Hoverflies get their name from their ability to hover in mid-air. Many hoverflies mimic wasps, honey-bees or bumble-bees with stripes, bands and markings of black and yellow. However, hoverflies do not bite or sting.

Hoverfly hovering behaviour is unlike that of hummingbirds since they do not feed in midair. Hovering in general may be a means of finding a food source; in addition, male hovering is often a territorial display seeking females, while female hovering serves to inspect ovipositing (egg-laying) sites.

What's blocking Yorkshire pipes?

Did you know that 46% of blockages in Yorkshire are caused by wipes! Even flushable wipes block pipes! Yorkshire Water tell us that '*all wipes are unflushable, even biodegradable ones*'. The facts from Yorkshire Water are that if we all flushed just one wipe, there would be 5.7 million of them causing blockages in Yorkshire pipes.

Wipes contain plastic fibres that can build up in your pipes, eventually causing a nasty flood in your garden or even worse your home.

No one wants to see that mucky old wipe again, especially when it has spent some time down the sewers, but it can happen, unless we all make few simple changes and put a stop to blockages.

One of our readers in Silkstone Parish, shared that because one of her neighbours constantly flushed baby wipes down the toilet, the pipes were blocked and it drained towards her garden, it cost her £380 to be sorted out by Yorkshire Water.

So a tip from Yorkshire Water is make some room in



your bathroom for a bin, or ditch the wipes completely and use a flannel with cleanser – it is better for your pores and your pipes!

Yorkshire water state:

'We've committed £180 million to improve our storm overflows and are working with partners to look at how we do this....

We're investing millions in improving our network, focussing on the worst-performing areas for sewer flooding'.

so Bin it, don't block it!

As I go to write this, I see from my earlier articles that crimes have taken place again in our Parish recently similar to before; males in masks, though this time entering a property with the intent to steal with the owners present. Shocking to say the least.

Thankfully crime overall is low in our Parish, but when something such as this happens, it sends shockwaves through our community. Yet I have seen there is still a reluctance to report some crimes that have happened. I can only repeat again that this <u>is</u> worth doing! Police resources are stretched, so they will focus deployment where there is the greatest need. So, no crimes reported, no attendance or increased Police presence in the area.

Reporting also helps build up intelligence that the Police can use to capture and help build evidence against perpetrators. The more crimes found proven against a person will lead to longer prison sentences, keeping our streets safer for longer.

Last year, I set up a Silkstone Parish Community Safety WhatsApp group. Only a handful of parishioners joined. For this to be truly successful, we need more to join as it relies wholly on the sharing of information. I don't always see the village Facebook page updates quickly, so there can be a delay in getting information from there.



The more people we have in the group, the more information we will get, and it will be cascaded around our Parish quicker. I can also share with local Neighbourhood Watch groups and vice versa. Forewarned can be forearmed!

I know this network of communication works, so please consider joining by texting me on the number below your preferred name to be added to the group. None of your contact details will be shared with a third party.

Silkstone Common Good Companions Lose Their Founder Member, Terry Daniels, at the Start of 2024

Members of Silkstone Common Good Companions were saddened to hear of the death of their founder member, Terry Daniels 89, in January 2024. Terry had been poorly for a while and was not able to make recent meetings but he still took an active interest in what the group were doing in his absence. Members will really miss both Terry and his wife Deanna, who is also not able to attend now because of illness.

Terry was the founder and Secretary of the group from its inception in December 1961 until he stepped down in 2021.Thankfully, he was able to join us in December 2021 when we celebrated 60 years of Good Companions with a party and a presentation. He was also awarded the first Honorary Freedom of the Parish of Silkstone in 2011 for his service to our group and the local community.

As a young man Terry worked for the welfare department of The West Riding of Yorkshire, and they tasked him with setting up the group in Silkstone as the church parishioners felt they needed something to combat loneliness for senior citizens. Terry was the driving force behind a long serving committee which helped run the group and along with his wife Deanna, arranged speakers, trips and entertainment for the members on a fortnightly basis in the rooms behind the Methodist church in Silkstone Common.

At its height the group had 70 members but unfortunately numbers have now dwindled down to around only 18 regular attendees. Despite this the group still meet and enjoy activities fortnightly on a Wednesday from 2-4pm. In the Autumn session we were treated to a visit from the U3A Ukelele band, a very helpful and informative advice session on how to avoid being scammed, a chair exercise and games meeting, as well as a visit from members of Cawthorne band who entertained us with a selection of Christmas music and stories to get us in the mood for our superb Christmas lunch at The Station Inn. In the new year local musician, Kevin Kitchen, who was a brilliant entertainer, and as always members could not resist the urge to get up and dance! Future plans include a summer seaside trip, a talk by Penistone's Jim Morton who has walked the coast of mainland Britain to raise money for the Gurkhas, a horse race event and a visit from a Support Dogs' group.

Terry was a quiet, modest man who was a stalwart member of our club. We are unlikely to see the likes of such long-term dedication again. He volunteered and gave his time and expertise to help make sure that people in our community had friendship and companionship as they got older.

I have been to South Korea!

My name is James and I am an **Explorer Scout** and a Young Leader at Silkstone Scouts



and I have been to South Korea!

I applied to attend the 25th World Scout Jamboree in December 2021 and was invited to attend a selection weekend. I found out just before Christmas 2021 that I had been chosen to part of Unit 43, South Yorkshire. I was really excited about this as its's a once in a lifetime opportunity to be part of this Scouting event, which happens only every 4 years, each time hosted by a different country.

The World Scout Jamboree started in 1920 and in 2023 more than 43,000 Scouts, from 158 countries attended in South Korea, Saemanguem.

The adventure had been planned for years, but it did not go as planned. It wasn't easy: the weather played a major part in the experience. Before I went, there was a monsoon, which led to the campsite being flooded. While at camp, South Korea experienced temperatures in excess of 35c every day and this combination made conditions just right for insects to breed. Many Scouts and leaders were treated for heat related illnesses and bug bites! This was then followed by typhoon Khanun, which brought torrential rain and winds!

The conditions on site were challenging; The site was flooded with serious drainage issues, I set my tent up on plastic pallets in water, the toilet and showers were not cleaned and had drainage issues. The bins were always full and overflowing, the drinking water supply was affected and food supplies to camp were limited. Access across the site was difficult as it was 8.8km²!

On site, I did have the opportunity to meet Scouts from across the world, trade memorabilia from their country, experience the opening ceremony and take part in one activity – air bag jumping.

After a few difficult days, the UK contingent decided to move us back to Seoul and continue our adventure there. I was disappointed to leave site, however conditions were very difficult.

In Seoul, we had the opportunity to experience Korean hospitality and culture. We had the opportunity to connect to local Korean people, who were friendly and kind to us. Korea generously hosted activities for Scouts; organising tickets for football and baseball games. We saw traditional Korean dance at a cultural centre, watched a dance party in Gwanghwamum square and even took part in Ceilidh dancing, hosted by a Scottish unit.

We visited a local town of Gunsan, the Gunsan Modern history museum, Jinpo Maritime Park, Coex aquarium and Coex Starfield mall. We also had the opportunity to visit the Demilitarized zone (DMZ), the border between South and North Korea. We experienced all different types of wonderful Korean food. I visited Gyeongbokgung Palace, the Gangnam district, the Blue House, Sarang church, the National Museum of Korea. We went in the Namsan mountain cable car to the Seoul Tower and we even went to Caribbean Bay water-park!

Scouts were able to reunite for the WSJ closing ceremony, which took place at the Seoul World cup stadium. This was followed by an amazing K-Pop concert.

I really did have a memorable adventure. I made lots of friends from all around the world, experienced Korean culture and became much more resilient to life's challenges!

I have not been deterred from Scouting or adventure. I am planning my next journey for this summer; to complete the Explorer Belt Award - a 10-day expedition across Ireland with 50 hours of walking and completing challenges along the way.
