


Working Together

It was an absolute pleasure to work with a number of our local Scouts one Monday evening in September.

Members of Silkstone CARE (community action in the local environment) provided an opportunity for our local scouts to learn new skills. The end result was superb. As part of the CARE biodiversity action plan we have committed to creating habitats, in the form of dead hedges, for insects and small animals. Together we created something very special behind the Huskar rooms in Silkstone. The scouts were very happy to collect fallen branches and twigs from Conroyd Wood and then to weave and build the dead hedge. Also some scouts collected suitable material to make a bug hotel, the original basis was two unwanted wooden pallets.

All materials used were from recycled sources, preventing items going into landfill.



There was great interest from the scouts and because so many turned up on the evening we needed to split them up and send them off on different tasks. Together with dead hedge and bug house building they took it in turns to also litter pick around the playing fields.

The scouts are an asset to our community, they were a pleasure to work with, hopefully they will remember the experience.

Silkstone Church Pews

This year marks the 200th anniversary of the installation of the current box pews in Silkstone church. Since the late eighteenth century the old Georgian box pew were in a very poor state and desperately needed replacing. By 1825 the church agreed to let Joseph Moseley, of Cawthorne, carry out the required work at a final cost of £454/7/0.

The pews also ran down both the north and south aisles of the church, however in 1967 the pews were found to be rotten and infested with woodworm so they had to be removed.

In order to cover the cost of the pews they were either sold or rented to parishioners. The pews would only have been affordable to the great and the good of Silkstone, ordinary families would have been reduced to finding somewhere to stand or if they were fortunate make use of an empty pew. All the pews were numbered and those parishioners who purchased a pew laid claim to them by either adding a brass name plate or by painting their name in stylised script. As part of their house deeds, some of the older properties still standing, include a pew in Silkstone church.

Robert Couldwell Clarke's name appears frequently, as well as Noblethorpe he owned several properties in Silkstone Parish, Bullah Hall being one of them.



Thomas West, a Cawthorne landed gentleman, purchased a pew in Silkstone church. His daughter, Ann, went on the marry one of the sons of mechanical engineer and inventor, Joseph Bramah.



Brothers Joseph and John Charlesworth, coal magnates, of Field Head were responsible for the development of Higham and Dodworth Collieries.



Sunday services didn't always run smoothly. It was reported in the Leeds
Times of 7th October 1854 that a fight had broken out in church, which the wardens had to break up. The family of Joseph Shaw had been allocated a large pew by the churchwardens. For some weeks the family had attended church only to find that someone had been into church earlier on and removed their cushions and books and placed them in another pew.

Richard Crawshaw, an elderly man from Dodworth had taken possession of Mr. Shaw's pew and during one Sunday service refused to move. This resulted in an argument between the two men disturbing the service and Mr Crawshaw assaulting Mr. Shaw. The case was heard at the Magistrates Court who found Mr Crawshaw guilty, and fined him 5/- and costs amounting to £1/6/-

Next time you visit the church and sit a while in the pews, consider the hundreds

of people who have sat there before you. They shared happy times, such as weddings and baptisms. Sad times, including the mass funeral of the 26 child miners lost in the Huskar disaster of 1838, and remembering the fallen of two World Wars. What stories our Silkstone ancestors could have told.

Recipe of the Season - Xmas Biscuits

Time to prepare less than 30 mins
Cooking time 10 to 30 mins
Makes around 36 biscuits

Ingredients

- 100g/3½oz unsalted butter, softened at room temperature
- 100g/3½oz caster sugar
- 1 egg, lightly beaten
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 275g/10oz plain flour

To decorate

- 400g/14oz icing sugar
- 3-4 tbsp water
- 2-3 drops food colouring
- Edible glitter/silver balls etc

Method

- Preheat the oven to 190C/375F/Gas 5.
 Line a baking tray with baking paper.
- Cream the butter and sugar together in a bowl until pale, light and fluffy.
- Beat in the egg and vanilla extract, a little at a time, until well combined.
- Stir in the flour until the mixture comes together as a dough.
- Roll the dough out on a lightly floured work surface to a thickness of 1cm/ ½in.
- Using biscuit cutters or a glass, cut biscuits out of the dough and carefully place onto the baking tray.



- To make into Christmas tree decorations, carefully make a hole in the top of the biscuit using a straw.
- Bake the biscuits for 8-10 minutes, or until pale golden-brown. Set aside to harden for 5 minutes, then cool on a wire rack.
- For the icing, sift the icing sugar into a large mixing bowl and stir in enough water to create a smooth mixture. Stir in the food colouring.
- Carefully spread the icing onto the biscuits using a knife and add decorations. Set aside until the icing hardens.

Options

- As well as circles and stars consider Xmas trees?
- Try putting a snowman's face on, use two different colours to give the snowman a hat/scarf
- Less sugar?
 - Use use 60g/2½oz soft brown muscovado sugar instead of 100g/ 3½oz caster sugar. Increase the vanilla extract to 2 teaspoons.
 - Use dark chocolate instead of icing sugar


It was wonderful to see a room full of people laughing, chatting, and helping one another, exactly what a Community Hub should be. Hopefully, it is a sign of great things to come!

Ramblings of a Parish Priest...

I am often asked, 'what does a Vicar do?' and to be honest I sometimes ask myself a variant of that question, 'what am I to do?', in response to the many and varied situations that present themselves. Vicars do have job a description of sorts but I suppose the bottom line is that we have to be ready for anything. No two days are the same and it only takes one email or phone call, and my best laid plans can be thrown in to disarray! To be honest I wouldn't have it any other way. I suppose its more like a lifestyle than a job description. One of my favourite 'funnies' in response to the question from parishioners is, 'I'm paid to be good, you are good for nothing!'

There is a great tradition in the Church of England of the much loved but eccentric Vicar. I try not to reinforce this tradition and I have been described as such, but I'll leave you to decide!

My 'job' in a nutshell is summed up in three words, Prayer, People and Preaching...lots of prayer, pastoral care and short (?) pithy sermons. There is much more bolted on to that and some days I'm a mixture of building conservation officer, museum curator, graveyard advisor and cake and coffee tester. There are the services which I affectionately and with love, call 'Hatch, match and dispatch'. This where a parish priest is privileged to be alongside people in their joys and deep pain of loss and grief and where pastoral care is most keenly felt.

In my opinion, whilst I spend much of my time in and around the parish church, my ministry belongs to the whole community not just the gathered Sunday worshippers. I'm not a 'chaplain to the congregation' but a priest to the parish and for me that means four times over with a multi parish benefice....no rest for the wicked, as a parishioner ruefully commented to me recently!

If you haven't already gathered, Christmas is a coming, with it's family and community traditions which are much loved. Many of the church events have become a part of your own traditions and one of them is the Family Crib Service held in the Chancel of All Saints.

It always amazes me how the old old story comes afresh to us each year. It could perhaps become wearisome for me with six carol services, five Christingles, four Christmas fairs, three Nativities...and a Partridge in a pear tree!...but the joy and happiness that the congregation bring keeps it all fresh.

So, as you make your preparations for the Christmas season I hope you will continue to support and enjoy the open door of All Saints Church, and hear afresh the message from the angels of the hope of Peace on Earth through the gift of the babe of Bethlehem.



Silkstone Parish Boundary walk

The Parish Boundary walk is now marked out along its full length and available for everyone to enjoy. This walks follows the footpaths closest to the parish boundary is 12 kilometres or 7.5 miles and takes in some of the most beautiful parts of our parish.

The walk is best started from any of the points in the instructions overleaf.

- Starting in Silkstone Common either from the Station Inn or The Stables coffee shop.
- In Silkstone, it can be started from: The Bells, The Red Lion, the Potting Shed or Silkstone Garage/shop.
- However, it is possible to start anywhere along the walk.

The walk is marked up in both clockwise and anti-clockwise directions though the instructions overleaf are for the anti-clockwise walk.

Look out for the hexagonal waymarkers at every change of direction. Use the map and instructions if needed.

If you start the walk in either of the village centres and prefer to just do half the walk, use the bus to return to your starting point.

The 21 and 21a services connect the villages and the timetable can be found at www.travelsouthyorkshire.com.

The distance between the two starting points at Silkstone Common and Silkstone is around a mile.

Please, don't forget..

- Close all gates behind you
- Take all litter home
- Keep dogs under close control
 Take care when crossing roads and railways
 Wear suitable clothing and footwear
- Respect the people who live and work in the countryside and their property.



The Waymarker



Starting in Silkstone Common either from the Station Inn or The Stables coffee shop. In Silkstone, it can be started from: The Bells, The Red Lion, the Potting Shed or Silkstone Garage/shop

Starting at the Station Inn

- Walk from the station Inn past the bus stop and Station steps and continue past the entrance to Black Horse Drive. Just past the entrance turn left onto the Trans Pennine Trail.
- 2. Follow the path down on to the flat surfaced path. Follow this path to the railway bridge over Moorend Lane. Drinks can be bought from the Stables follow the signs from the turn off just past the railway bridge. It is also possible to join this walk from the Moorend Lane a short walk from The Stables. The walk itself continues along the Trans Pennine Trail past the stone seat. Just before the end of the woods the walk takes the path on the left into the woods.
- 3. Follow the path upwards through the woods and after approximately 100 meters, take the stile on the right and follow the path that goes across two fields to a track. At the track, turn left up the hill and follow the track to emerge at the main road by the farm.
- Cross the main road and turn left back towards Silkstone Common. When you reach the next lane, turn up the lane towards the top (Champany Hill).
- 5. At the top of the hill by the side of the house, turn right to take the footpath that leads in a northerly direction down the hill. As it reaches the main wood, the path leads slightly right down the hill in a north-easterly direction until it eventually reaches a railway crossing.

- Cross with care and take the left turn and shortly afterwards turn right. The path leads through the wood eventually emerging by the barrier, a small car park and sign to Silverwood scout camp. From here walk to the main A628 Barnsley road.
- 6. Cross the A628 with care and continue along Fall Head Lane. At the end of Fall Head Lane, the lane turns into a path by the edge of the wood that drops down the hill and emerges by the sewage works. Go through the metal gate and take the path over the bridge, a second bridge and around the edge of the sewage works. The path goes under (or over) a large raised pipe and turns left onto Silkstone Waggonway Trail.

If you wish to finish the half walk here or get some refreshments in Silkstone, follow the Waggonway Trail in a southerly direction to the village. The Waggonway crosses the road by the Potting Shed and continues into Silkstone village.

If you wish to start from Silkstone, take the Waggonway Trail (northerly direction) and take the rough road on the left.

- 7. Take the rough track that splits right from the Waggonway Trail. This leads to the Silkstone to Cawthorne road. At the road, turn left back towards Silkstone and after about 100m, opposite the start of the cottages on the left, cross the road and take the footpath along the side of the houses.
- 8. The footpath follows the edge of the houses, it then leads into the adjacent field. Continue uphill, enter the next field, for approximately 50 m, the footpath then goes diagonally right across the field towards the wooded valley bottom. Enter the wooded area, walk down towards the stream, cross the bridge and follow this clear path until you reach a stile. This leads into an open field and the path turns right up the field. At the top of the field turn left and follow the hedge up to the wall that marks the start of Banks Hall.
- Cross the stile and walk straight on.
 Pass in front of Banks Hall. Pass through two small gates, adjacent to large farm gates. Enter a track leading away from Banks Hall. Continue walking in a straight line until eventually you arrive at South Lane.
- 10. At South Lane, continue in the same direction as South Lane on the parallel track. After around 130 meters, take the footpath signposted to the left down the fields to the stile at the bottom into the woods.
- 11. Cross Elmhirst Beck / Banks Bottom
 Dike and follow the path in a straight
 southerly direction until you reach Pye
 Flatts and the A628.
- 12. At the A628 walk (left) down the hill for around 120 metres. Cross with care to

- the footpath on the other side. Take the footpath across the field, over the wooded stream another field until Kine Moor Lane is reached.
- 13. At Kine Moor Lane, turn right (south east) and along the lane until the first bend.
- 14. At the slight bend (metal gate) you enter the field and follow the public footpath. After approximately 30 metres take the footpath sign leading gently right. The footpath leads along the hedges and turns left down to Lower Storrs Wood.
- 15. Cross the bridge in the wood and up the path until the next path is reached which turns left into the wood (if you reach the wall with a field on the other side, you have gone a little too far). Follow the path in an approximately straight line through the wood across a woodland track before reaching a footbridge over the stream. The path goes quite steeply up the wood and a stile that leads across the edge of a field to a lane that passes Lower Coates Farm. At the lane, turn right up the hill.
- 16. The track leads up the hill and over the railway line. It immediately goes over another bridge where there is a left turn. Take this path which is part of the Trans Pennine Trail through the woods towards Silkstone Common.
- 17. To return to the Station Inn and the start of the walk, just turn left back into the village.

Crime Prevention information and advice

The darker evenings are now with us and with the festive season soon to be upon us, it can make us more vulnerable to becoming a victim of crime.

The website www.crime-statistics.co.uk does provide local crime data, though at the time of writing this, the data was historic and 2 months old. It will however give you an idea of what is happening in the parish. Most of the local crime reported does appear to be in the vicinity of the garage, where anti-social behaviour and criminal damage is on a frequent basis.

Compared to the towns around our parish, thankfully our crime is low. If anything does happen, there has been justified outrage, but then complacency settles back in.

Prevention is always better than 'cure'. So here are some reminders of crime prevention advice that can prevent you becoming a statistic. Many are obvious, but it does no harm to be reminded of good practice. Life is hectic and it is so easy to overlook things or not bother about something, until you wish you had done so as you are claiming on insurance!

The internet has loads of crime prevention advice available. The South Yorkshire Police website includes plenty of guidance of how to make your house, outbuildings and vehicles more secure. Some quick tips:

Outside the house:

Consider a PIR light that lights up when it detects movement. A light constantly on can deter criminals as they can be seen.

However, it can also assist them as they can see what they are doing as they break into your home! A light suddenly coming on can be startling and indicate someone is there. A constant light being on becomes the norm and so can be ignored.

Consider securing the access around your house with a gate and a strong padlock.

Some houses are still open to anyone walking to the rear of a property unchecked.

CCTV, burglar alarms or a camera type doorbell are all good for deterring those with unscrupulous intent and can capture images to aid Police investigation.





Yes, these measures all incur a cost, some however do not have to be expensive; even a dummy camera is a visual deterrent. If you were a burglar, which property would you try to enter, one that looked to have strong, locked gates, a camera or burglar alarm, or the property with none of these?

We have probably all heard that most crime is planned, and certain properties or vehicles are targeted, so nothing you do will help. Having worked as a civilian with

a Police Crime Prevention team and then 26 years in the Criminal Justice system, I know from having personally spoken with convicted criminals it is still worth making it more difficult for perpetrators to commit a crime. There are still opportunist thieves around; some even simple measures can and do prevent crime or have assisted with catching those responsible.

Vehicle theft:

Apparently, any make of car is vulnerable these days; be it a high-performance vehicle for selling on, or a small run around that could be used in a crime as a getaway. Again, there are lots of deterrents that can be purchased. Many cars are already equipped with alarm systems or a tracking device, but a visual deterrent can save a broken window.



There are steering locks, rigid ones or ones that are pliable and resistant to being cut that secure into

your seat belt lock and can only be undone with a key. Thieves will mostly want to acquire a vehicle quickly so a device that slows their getaway could save them taking your vehicle and lead them to an easier target.

Christmas/Holiday Periods

If you are going away, consider informing a trusted neighbour, who can keep an eye on your property. If your driveway will be empty, offer the use of it out to others so your property looks occupied.

Consider getting plugs through which you can programme lights, TV's or TV

simulators, radios etc to on at set times to imply someone is around.

Another obvious thing is don't put presents under a Christmas Tree that can be easily seen through a window.

So, this is just a reminder of crime preventive measures that can be taken. However, should you become a victim of crime, I will say, as I always will, please report it! I know, I have heard too many times of 'what is the point'. Well, areas of low crime will not be a police priority. Resources are stretched; a good use of a limited resource is to target areas of most concern. So, mostly we will rarely see a police officer here for anything other than a crime that has happened. The PCSO's who cover the parish have told me they will only be sent here to patrol if there is a concern; so, the more that is reported, the more likely the parish will see them being visible.

Gardening with Matt B

Work with your garden

From the last article we now have a garden layout to blend into your existing garden.

Working with your space is a great way to both achieve a fantastic space, but also to give character to your garden that nowhere else can have. It's also a great way to keep costs lower.

There are some key fundamental aspects to working with your garden;

Ground Level Changes

Level changes across a garden are something which, of late, seem to be abhorred. However, they are a key component of interesting gardens. Working creatively with changes in level can really enhance the journey through a garden and whilst initially can pose some issues, really will elevate a space.

Some elements do of course need to be level, patios for example. However, keep these to a minimum, and link spaces together using your existing ground changes. Working in this way creates some unique design opportunities. Steps are a great example of this, a functional element of level change, which can be turned into a stunning feature. Think of grand staircases in stately homes, often a celebrated focal point.

Equally as important as rising levels are sunken areas. Natural depressions should be exploited. Often damp they can be used creatively to form water features,

ponds, differing planting styles, again increasing interest and also vital habitats.

Materials & Vernacular

Now we have a layout it's time to choose materials for hard surfaces. There are a plethora of materials available, but where to start.

A great place to take inspiration is from the local area, or local vernacular. Using natural materials from the local area is a sure-fire way to link the garden to its place, a design consideration known as genius loci. We have lots of natural sandstone locally, which can be a great place to start. You can also look to architectural cues, using materials from your property, or properties in your views, to bring these materials into the garden giving consistency and clarity of design.

Conversely, a sharp contrast against local materials can create a unique design statement. This is something which I love to do, blending local and contemporary materials to create something very different and yet still linked to that sense of place.

Planting

Planting is a big topic we will cover further in the next article. However, the key element is to work with your space. We took notes in previous articles on damp areas, sunny spots etc. which are invaluable for planting. Working with your

garden to select plants which are happy in those locations.

Planting in this way not only leads to a happy and healthy garden, it also looks right. A woodland setting with a sunflower in, feels a bit off, but a lush green fern, perfect.

Overall, combining your layout with your existing garden will create a really unique space for you to enjoy and provides an overall tapestry of individual gardens in the local area. This tapestry has a huge benefit to the wider area by creating unique habitats. So work with your space, don't fight against it.
