
### A word from the Chair

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# Huskar Community Rooms – 10th Anniversary October 2025

In 2011 it was decided that the decrepit Scout and Guide hut had outlived its temporary status, lasting over 20 years. It was full of asbestos, one working toilet and was generally held together with duct tape!

A committee was formed to establish the needs of the community. Plans were drawn for a new centre that was fit for purpose, and which could be used by a variety of groups.



In October 2014 the old scout hut was demolished after the committee had raised su&icient funds through various activities and secured a government loan through the Parish Council for the balance. Work then began on a new building for the Parish of Silkstone, named Huskar Community Rooms.

A number of activities were held to raise funds, including an X Factor night, a donation envelope drop in both Silkstone and Silkstone Common. Also, during the construction some of villagers donated over 200 hours of voluntary time to paint the interior, with free paint, from Johnson Paint Centre, and

free equipment from KDA as we couldn't a£ord a professional decorator.




The building was opened in October 2015, with the ceremonial ribbon cut by Kate Rusby.

The building itself consists of two large rooms (a Dance & Fitness Studio and Activity Room), a large reception area, fully equipped kitchen, toilets (including disabled toilet) and baby changing facilities.



The Centre is host to a variety of classes and activities. The Maria Penrose Dance Studio operate from the Huskar Community Rooms Monday to Thursday and on Saturday, and the Main Activity Room is used in

the evening by Scouts (Monday), Cubs (Tuesday), Beavers (Wednesday) and Brownies (Thursday). During the day the Centre hosts activities for Toddlers (Mini Kicks, Baby Ballet, Robot Reg) and those not quite so young (Yoga, Pilates and Warm Welcome).



There are opportunities for other groups to hire the building. The Dance & Fitness Studio is available most mornings, should you wish to set up a

Yoga, Pilates or Exercise Class. While the general Activity Room could be used for a variety of art, craft or hobby based groups. This room can also be used for birthday parties and other celebrations.



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# The Silkstone Village Stocks

The two large stones which form the stocks have stood in Silkstone for over 600 years. Two Acts were passed in 1351 and 1405 for every village to maintain a set of stocks. Located next to the village green on Stocks Hill, they were placed to be in full view of anyone passing so that the public humiliation and shame endured would deter others from committing similar crimes.

Victims could be kept in the stocks for up to 3 days mainly for petty crimes such as persistent swearing, foul language, drunkenness or brawling. During their time in the stocks, they would be open to ridicule as passers-by, who would spit on them, throw rotten vegetables or even empty their chamber pots on them amongst other humiliating acts.

The largest stone was known as the whipping stone where those convicted of more serious crimes would be tied and whipped until their backs drew blood. This was done in public, again to deter others, and was typically used on vagrants, vagabonds and beggars who refused to work and were seen as idle, lazy and a drain on society.

Written records were not kept, but stocks were used as punishment in Britain for over 400 years into the early 1800s. Their location in the centre of the village also meant that they were the focal point for fairs and gatherings. In 1901 a newspaper article noted that a huge bonfire continued to be lit there every 5th

November and had been for several generations.

Some stocks were recognised as being of historical importance, but those at Silkstone, although they remained in place, were not protected or preserved as this photograph from the 1940s shows.




In 1953 the Parish Council considered renovating the stocks as a memorial to the Queen's Coronation. The scheme didn't go ahead due to costs being too high and the idea was shelved.

This photo taken in the early 1970s shows the stocks and the surrounding area.



In 1975 the idea of improving the stocks was resurrected but the Parish Council were split over the costs with one councillor arguing that "they are not even recognisable as stocks. There is a sewage ventilation pipe standing between what is left of them. No-one knows if there is any history attached to them and people don't care about them". Others argued that "it is certainly not a waste of money improving part of our local history. I am sure much of the cost could be met by Government grants".

Consequently, Barnsley Council agreed to look at a scheme to bring the stocks back to their original state and improve the surrounding area and in June 1976 they announced a project to upgrade the stocks and uncover part of the old wagonway nearby. The illustration below was done in the late 1970s.



In 1987 the stocks were listed as a Grade II listed monument and in 2012 the area was improved further by members of the Roggins Local History Group.

### **#ITSOKAYTOTALK**

In mid-2016, nine men met in a small room in the stereotypical Yorkshire town of Halifax with a simple aim of talking through their issues and helping each other deal with their mental health. All in attendance agreed there was magic in that room that had to be shared. This was the start of a movement that has grown faster than anyone first involved could have ever imagined. Fast forward 8 years and ANDYSMANCLUB now has groups in over 260 locations, stretching from Plymouth to Aberdeen.

ANDYSMANCLUB takes its name from Andrew Roberts, a man who sadly took his own life aged 23 in early 2016. Andy's family had no inkling that he was sucering or struggling to the extent that he would do this, and as a result looked deeper into male suicide and men's mental health. They soon discovered that male suicide is the biggest killer of men under 54, with male mental health surrounded by wellingrained cultural stigma in the UK.

Elaine Roberts and Luke Ambler are Andy's Mum and Brother-in-Law, together they came up with the idea of ANDYSMANCLUB, a group where men aged 18 and above can speak openly about their mental health in a judgement-free, non-clinical environment.



Groups now operate nationwide and are completely volunteer-led, with the vast majority of group facilitators having first interacted with ANDYSMANCLUB when they came through the door as a service user. Following on from the COVID-19 pandemic, ANDYSMANCLUB created an online function via Google Meet. This follows the same model and enables men who cannot leave their home due to a variety of issues to join sessions. In the long-term, the charity aims to have a location within 30 minutes travel of any man in the UK.

# A new year, a new garden?

I have a series of articles planned for the Silkstone Newsletter, exploring garden design. From garden concept through to material choices, whether editing an existing garden, or starting a new one.

### The Journey

A garden starts by thinking about the journey. No, I don't mean how to get to the bins or which route to take to the washing line (these come later), it's about how you want your garden to make you feel.

At first this seems a bit abstract, but imagine a world which didn't influence our feelings, super dull. How your garden makes you feel is key to a great space, linking deeply to our sub-conscious. Envisage the tunnels on the Trans-Pennine Trail. For me, walking into these tunnels evokes a sense of confinement and darkness, I feel nervous. At the opposite end of the tunnel, I relax; light, open expanse and air. A simple journey highlighting how the space around us influences our emotions.

Applied to gardens, we can really enhance the overall experience by creating a journey. Now I'm not suggesting you put a train tunnel in the garden, but I am suggesting you work with the principle to create a varied and interesting space. An archway along a path can create a sense of confinement, before opening onto a border or lawn. A change in direction can create a new aspect of the garden, or perhaps a hedge to create a feeling of refuge when you sit down for your morning

coSee. These subtle elements play with our senses, creating a journey within the garden.

The first step is to consider how you want the garden to make you feel. Create a list of adjectives; enclosed, safe, peaceful, bold, adventurous, eye-catching. This approach moves away from the typical 'cottage garden' or 'contemporary garden' and gets to the deeper knowledge of how you want your garden to make you feel.

It is important not to cloud your inspiration with detail, the words hedge, fence, path, shouldn't factor here, that comes later. The key thing is to open your mind to your creativity.

An exercise to get working creatively is 'the 12 uses of a brick'.

Write down the 12 uses of a brick, pretty simple right? Or not!

Look back over your answers, and you should notice that the first few are straightforward; build a wall, as a door stop, a paper weight. However, once you get to the later uses, you'll notice that they get more creative; A (bad) Christmas present, hollow out to make a pencil pot.

Now do the same with your garden, building a list of adjectives. You want to feel; calm, peaceful, tranquil, still...., consider the feel in diĎerent garden areas, be creative, unconstrained, take inspiration from life experiences; I want to feel like I did when.... Re-visit the list and refine it, using each new word as inspiration for the next.

Next time, we will start to look at how to

put this into the garden, bringing in practicality, whilst keeping the feel, using Mass and Void.

# Silkstone Parish Walks

Silkstone to Kine Moor



# **Walk Description**

- A. The walk starts and finishes at the Ring'O'Bells public house From the rear of the Ring'O'Bells take the old Waggon road towards Silkstone Cross. View the reconstruci on of a Waggonway coal truck at Silkstone Cross. Cross the road to the petrol stal on.
- B. Take the footpath to the right of the petrol stal on: go past the pavilion and the cricket pitch and over the sl les towards Woolley Manor Farm.
- C. At Woolley Manor Farm turn lelJ along Blacker Green Lane.
- D. At Blacker Dam turn right across Kine Moor to High Field Plantal on.
- E. At Kine Moor Lane turn lell and conl nue to the fork.
- F. Take the lelJ fork and alJer 20 yards take the footpath to the right across fields.
- G. Enter Lower Storrs Wood, crossing over a footbridge and then ascend to a wall where two paths cross. Turn lelJ through woodland, coni nuing forward at crossing of paths to a second footbridge. A steep rise leads to fields and a footpath to Lower Coates Farm
- H. Turn lelJ on Blacker Green Lane noi ng Silkstone Parish boundary stone set in the north side of the wall.
- I. Turn right onto footpath at Lindley Dyke and cross si le into field.
- J. Keeping Royd Hill Farm to your right follow the path rising steeply across the centre of the field to join with the road.
- K. At tarmac road (Cone Lane) turn lell downhill past railway bridge and then fork right at next road junci on onto Beacon Hill.
- L. At West View houses turn lelJ on footpath then go to right of Hill Top CoŁ ages and descend across fields and si les to Bank House Farm.
- M. Cross the Silkstone by-pass and Silkstone Beck on footpath to return to the Ring'O'Bells PH.



### General Information

Distance - 3 ½ miles. Some sections can have wet, muddy or uneven ground and weather conditions can vary. Choose appropriate footwear and clothing.

### **Additional Information**

- AB The Waggonway was a horse drawn railway constructed in 1809 to carry coal to the canal head 2 1/2 miles away at Cawthorne Basin. Some of the original stone sleepers can be seen on the footpath to the rear of the Ring'O'Bells.
- C Woolley Manor Farm is a Grade II listed building dating from the 17th Century.
- D Blacker Dam originally supplied water to three mills in Silkstone, which used corn, iron and bone. In the earl) 20th Century it was used for recreation including boating and fishing.
- H The Silkstone Boundary Stone at Lower Coates Farm depicts a hot air balloon which flew over the parish in the 19th Century.
- L Hill Top Cottages are the oldest dwellings in Silkstone Common. Note the Yorkshire stone roof, which was the commonly used material before the arrival of the railways in the mid 19th Century allowed the import of Welsh slate.
- M Bank House Farm was once a public house. The stocks date from 1405 and were restored in the late 20th Century.

# Remembrance Day 2025

### Poppy Appeal - Your opportunity to get involved

Yes, it's only springtime but we would like to start preparing for Remembrance Day 2025.

We invite you to get knitting, or

crocheting, to prepare as many poppies as possible.


Working in collaboration with the Tuesday crafting club we would like to paint the villages red. Well actually, decorate our villages with handmade poppies as part of the Remembrance Day commemorations.

It's really not that di&icult. You buy the yarn, we provide two patterns below. Get working and we will explain where the collection points will be in a later edition of the PC newsletter.

### **Knitting Pattern**

### You will need

- 4mm needles
- Double knitting any shade of red yarn



Darning needle

### **Body of the Poppy**

Using the red wool, cast on 60 stitches

Rows 1 to 10 Knit 2, Purl 2

Row 11 Knit 2 together across the row

Row 12 Slip 1, Knit 2 together, pass the stitch over, across the row.

Break oE the yarn and thread it back through the last stitch, pull tight and join the edges together.

### Centre of the Poppy

Use the black yarn. Cast on 8 stitches. Knit a square, alternate knit row and purl row. Cut the yarn leaving a tail. The purl side is the upside. Run a line of stitches around the edges of the square. Pull the edges of the square into a round and tuck under.

### **Creating the Poppy**

To finish oE, stitch the centre to the body of the poppy.

Or alternatively use a black or green button.

### Remembrance Poppy Crochet Pattern



You will need red and black yarn – DK works well and a 4mm crochet hook.

### Black Yarn:

Ch6 and join with a ss into first Ch to make a loop.

Alternatively make a 'Magic Loop' which allows you to reduce the size of the centre hole – you can find instructions on internet.

### Round 1

ch2 (counts as first dc) work 11dc into loop = 12 stitches

\*remember if you want a larger black centre then work treble crochet instead of double crochet into the central loop.

Cast oE and change to Red Yarn.

### Round 2

Into any stitch cast on red and ch2 (counts as 1st dc) into same stitch work 1dc. \*Work 2 dc into next stitch.

\*Repeat to end working 2 dc into every stitch= 24 stitches.

Join with a ss into 2nd ch you initially started with.

### Round 3

1st Petal. ch2 (counts as 1st dc), 2tr into next stitch, 2 tr into next stitch, 2 tr into next stitch, 1dc into next st.

2nd Petal. 1 dc into next stitch, 2 tr into next stitch, 2 tr into next stitch, 2 tr into next stitch, 1 dc into next stitch, 2 tr into next stitch, 1 dc into next st.

Repeat two more times = 4 petals = 40 stitches

### Round 4

Into each tr stitch from previous round work 2 dc followed by a ss in between the two dc from previous round. Cast o£.

Please leave 3 inches/8cms of both black ends for fixing. Sew in red ends.

alongside other trustees to promote,

grow and develop this valuable resource.

The role is a voluntary one, requiring a commitment of at least a couple of hours a month depending on your present availability and desire.

# The Importance of Knowing First aid and Basic Life Saving skills

Having been a first aider since the age of 9 years old as a member of St John's Cadets, First Aid skills are second nature to me. I am now teaching First Aid to local groups and volunteer youth groups, as I feel this is a worthy investment in our community.

Schools have the responsibility of enabling primary age children to understand how to summon help in an emergency. I would hope that secondary school students leave school with the ability to undertake basic lifesaving skills. From my experience and knowledge of young people, in my professional role and as a Scout Leader, I don't think they do!

I asked a group of young people why First Aid was important and their responses were considered - 'to help ill people get better', 'because we don't want to see our loved ones die without being able to do something to help'

Having asked the same question to adults, the results are similar but from a di&erent perspective, 'know what to do if he chokes...again', 'I look after my grandkids and would NEED to know what to do if the worst happened' and 'You never know when you might need it, that's how accidents work!'

Here are some examples of where adults and children have shared with me about how they have used their First Aid skills:

"When my Nannan had burnt her hand in the kitchen I made sure she held her hand under the cold water for 20 minutes and covered it with cling film. She was very upset but said she has no scars because it was the right thing to do' (young person).

'One customer collapsed on way out of the shop and was brought back in to be looked after, I treated her for shock and she went to hospital, she made a full recovery from her issue and has recently had a baby. Made feel so good to know that' (adult).

It seems that people KNOW it's important but, based on rising costs and household bills, are struggling to find the finances and time to attend. So, as a local freelance trainer, I've started looking at access to funding to make significant reductions in the cost of courses. I want to help folk especially those in most need, and possibly free where grants and funds are available, I also o&er discounts for those on relevant Benefits.

If you would like to know more, and talk to me about how I could support you as an individual or as a group, (e.g. Parent toddler - Walking pals - Sports team - Book club or even a local Gin club)

Please drop me an email or text to discuss what I may be able to do, to help you and your friends with the skills needed, should you find yourself in an emergency situation.

# Silkstone – St Florent Twinning Organisation

The Silkstone – St Florent Twinning organisation has been going for 34 years. As outlined by Harold Garfield, the Chairman of Silkstone Parish Council in his welcome to the first French Group to visit Silkstone in 1992, the aim of the Twinning organisation was to promote friendships and greater understanding of the di&erent cultures and to foster peace and goodwill at all times.

Our group of local individuals act on behalf of the Parish Council who are the signatories to the Twinning Agreement. The active members have changed over the years, many of the founding members have sadly passed away; others are unable to actively participate due to their failing health and age; some are still active and enjoying their interactions with friends both local and in the Vendee; new members have joined us over recent months and we are hoping that more will join. If the twinning partnership is to succeed in the future, we do need younger people to become involved.

As outlined in previous articles, the arrangements for the Twinning Visit in July this year are ongoing. We are still awaiting confirmation from St Florent of the numbers intending to visit, their mode of transport and any particular places they wish to visit.

Amongst the visitors will be a number of young people, teenagers who are supervised by two youth workers. I ask

that local people with teenagers consider welcoming a young person into their home for a few days. An excellent opportunity for students learning French to develop & practice their language skills.



I am aware this can be a frightening prospect and that you may feel you do not have the

capacity to have a visitor. Every support will be provided, if you are up and o£ to work early in the morning the young person staying with you can join another host family locally for breakfast and go on to the organised activities from there.

Group events/ meals will be arranged in the evenings for visitors and host families to socialise together. Host families are welcomed to participate in all activities and conversely there is no need to do so if they do not wish to.



It is not only young people who wish to learn a foreign language; indeed, I believe it is good for the more mature brain to learn a language. Personally, I have played at learning French on and o£ over the decades (I really should be better at it than I am). The upcoming visit has once

again focussed my mind on the subject. The twinning group have been in contact with Carl Dundas, a local language tutor, and some of us have arranged for a crash course of conversational French tuition. If you wish to be involved it may be possible to arrange further sessions.

We live in a wonderful area with many places to visit on our doorstep. Some of the activities we have suggested to our French friends are:-

which was accompanied by music. We had champagne with the firework display artist (quite famous apparently) afterwards in the VIP area. It was really rather special!




Overall, this is a really good way of learning about the culture of France and people that you simply wouldn't get if you stayed in a hotel or went camping.
