

Silkstone Common Methodist Chapel

supporting plans to make the chapel into a community hub. Progress has been very slow, due to circumstances beyond the Parish Council's control. We will however continue to try and find ways, if possible, to bring the building into parish ownership. The building has already been recognised as a public asset. There will be a public meeting held by the Methodist Church Council at 7:30pm on Monday 19th May 2025. I hope as many people will attend as possible.

Parish

The Parish Council continues to support Churches in the Parish where they can by providing grants for one off items.

Grants are also awarded to other community groups within Silkstone and Silkstone Common. Details of how to apply for a grant from the Parish Council can be found on the parish council website.

The Huskar Rooms have recently undergone many changes in the volunteers running the rooms, The Parish Council would like to especially thank Linda Jackson, Chair and Nick Perry Treasurer, outgoing Chair and Treasurer respectively who have worked hard to make the rooms a success in the past. I would like to welcome Stephen Dolman, the new treasurer, thank you for picking up the mantle. The Huskar Rooms still need more people to volunteer to help on the committee to continue with the success it has enjoyed since it opened.

Generally, our parish continues to have a low level of crime compared to other parts of the Borough. Remember is you see anything suspicious please use the 101-phone number for reporting non urgent crime.

Dog fouling continues to be an issue within the Parish. A minority of dog owners continue to allow their dogs to mess and not clear up. This is both inconsiderate and dangerous when allowed on the playing areas of both our recreation grounds.

Gardening with Matt B

Continuing our series on Garden Design

This issue builds from how you wish to feel in the garden and starts to create a layout.

A journey through a garden is all about creating changes of feel, through the use of mass and void. Mass is anything solid in the garden, it could be a hedge, a wall, plants or a tree. The key thing is that the mass constrains the space, bringing everything in or directing you around. Void on the other hand is open and freeing, bringing light and air, this could be an open lawn, a gap between shrubs or the sky.

Imagine you want your garden to feel calming and peaceful. Translating calm into mass and void, for me, would be by creating an enclosed central area, perhaps a lawn on which to sit. I would be surrounded by planting, but with space between me and the plants. I wouldn't want to be overlooked, but equally I wouldn't want to feel penned in. Imagining this scenario, we can use mass and void to create this space. An open central lawn, void, gives the feeling of air and openness. A low growing mass of plants surrounds, set at a comfortable distance away ensuring the area is not crowded. Beyond the planting some taller mass, a pleached hedge, to envelop the garden in green and give screening from neighbours.

Overall, the space uses mass and void to

create a feel of calm. The polar opposite of this is perhaps a maze. Cramped, tight, very directional and imposing. All created by having tall mass right up next to you. Great for getting lost in, perhaps not so good for a garden!

Along with mass and void comes proportion, which is good to relate back to a human scale. How does the mass or void relate to you and how you wish the garden to feel. For example, being above or below your eyeline is crucial for larger mass such as hedges.

Your next step is to take your list of adjectives from last time along with an outline of your garden and start to place mass and create void to carve out a journey. Do this repeatedly, you can use tracing paper over the outline, doodling away quickly to build different shapes and sizes of mass. Then at the end of each, consider how the mass or void you have created would impact on that journey. Is it maze like and busy, or more open and calming? Would it interrupt your usual path from your door? Would it create or interrupt sightlines from windows?

At the end you will have settled on an overall layout that is pleasing to you and creates an atmosphere you like. One key element at the outset is not to be overly practical. Think, I will have some 'mass' here, not 'I will have a hedge here'. These practicalities of hedges, patio or plants come later, when next time we will discuss how to choose these whilst

working with your garden.



Silkstone Hand Bells Come Home

In the early twentieth century Silkstone had a very successful group of hand bell ringers. They had three sets of hand bells making a total of 156 bells. The bells had been purchased by public subscription and it is believed that they were played in some rooms at Stable Fold.

Needing somewhere to house the hand bells, in 1923 three of the ringers signed an agreement with the then vicar of Silkstone, Rev. Joseph Prince, and the churchwardens that the church should be the custodians of the hand bells. One of the signatories was James Horsfield the great grandfather of Heritage Silkstone Chairman Andy Horsfield.

Since then, the hand bells have been on loan to various churches, chapels and colleges. In the 1960's the bells were in Noblethorpe Hall and then on loan to churches in the Selby area. Bretton College wanted to purchase the hand bells but it was stipulated that the bells could only be on loan to the college.

Over the following years the three sets of Silkstone hand bells were played at Bretton College, Byram church and churches and chapels in the Grassington area. Silkstone School also enjoyed playing the hand bells.

During this time some of the hand bells went missing and finally in 1984 139 hand bells went on loan to Cannon Hall Museum where they were kept in storage for many years.

Storage space at Cannon Hall needed to be rationalised so in March this year the hand bells were returned to Silkstone church for safe keeping.

During their time in storage the condition of the hand bells deteriorated. Some had been lost over the years leaving a total of 138 bells. Some have now been sent to a conservator for restoration. There are now 122 hand bells in the church in need of some TLC. One of the curators at Cannon Hall has offered help and advice on how to restore the hand bells so the village can hopefully have a set to play at the end of the restoration project.

The history of hand bell ringing in the Silkstone area goes back much earlier. Andy has searched through newspaper archives and the earliest record is when Mr Wentworth Beaumont of Bretton Hall married Lady Margaret Ann in March 1856. The bride and groom arrived early to listen to a performance by Silkstone ringers.

It would appear that hand bell ringing was very popular in the surrounding villages with mention of several completions fiercely fought. In October 1859 the Barnsley ringers travelled to play at the Crystal Palace.

All England Completions were held at the Zoological Gardens, Belle Vue, Manchester, attracting 20,000 visitors. In

1878 Silkstone ringers entered and came 4th winning £3.10s. The following year at the same venue they came 1st winning £15 and a gold medal. The test pieces of music were taken from works by Hayden and Mozart. Having reached notoriety Silkstone ringers were asked to play at several events in the nearby villages.

The popularity of hand bell ringing seemed to decline towards the end of the nineteenth century then in 1902 an article in a local newspaper stated that Charles Horsfield, the church sexton and one of the early ringers, intended to restart hand bell ringing in Silkstone.

The original set of bells for some unknown reason had been taken away by the late William Hoyland when he left the village. Three sets of recently acquired hand bells came under the chairmanship of Charles Horsfield who with other members of the original group had undertaken to teach new members. Charles Horsfield's nephew, James Horsfield was one of the new recruits and it was hoped that the new Silkstone ringers would once more take part in nation competitions.



Partridge Dale and Berry Moor

Walk Description

- A. The walk starts and finishes at Silkstone Common railway station. Leave the station and turn right along Knabbs Lane. At the end of the village turn right onto the Trans Pennine Trail (TPT). After 150 yards turn left over stiles and pass to the right of Knabb's Hall Farm.
- B. Follow footpath markers to Hadley House, turn left and take farm track to Coates Lane.
- C. Cross Coates Lane and follow footpath in a straight line downhill across fields and cross Hollin Dyke at bridge, after which ascend to Pinfold Lane.
- D. Turn left at Pinfold Lane and follow the road for a short distance turn right at kissing gate at Cobblers Bottom Farm towards Partridge Dale.
- E. At cottages turn left at signpost to Berry Moor House and here take stiles to right of the house, crossing several fields towards Dodworth Moor End.
- F. For the Huskar Monument turn left along House Carr Lane to railway bridge. Monument is just inside Nabs Wood. Retrace steps along House Carr Lane continue for 20 yards and then turn left at signposted footpath across middle of field.
- G. Ascend steps to join the former railway line, now the Dove Valley Trail, part of the Trans Pennine Trail. Turn left to view the Beyer-Garrett boundary stone on the Silkstone/Dodworth parish boundary.
- H. Return to the steps, decend and turn right through the tunnel, taking footpath to Moorend Houses.
- I. Follow track past Silkstone Equestrian Centre and Barn Owl Cottage.
- J. At Viewpoint House turn right to take footpath parallel with South Yorkshire Buildings and leading into Silkstone Common recreation ground.
- K. Leave recreation ground, cross Hall Royd Walk and take footpath to Ben Bank Road.
- L. At Ben Bank Road turn left and return to Silkstone Common railway station.

Additional Information

- A Knabbs Hall Farm is one of the oldest buildings in the village. It is known that the house was rebuilt in 1644 and that there was an earlier timber-framed house there. A large royal crest over the door implies that royalty once slept there.
- E Partridge Dale is aptly named. Other birds found in Tom Royd Wood include sparrowhawks in search of prey such as chaffinch or members of the tit family. In summer visitors from Africa include willow warblers and blackcaps.
- F-G To the left where you cross House Carr Lane in Nabs Wood (owned by the Woodland Trust, but with public access) is the location of the day hole or drift of the former Moorend Colliery. Here on the 4th July 1838 a violent thunderstorm led to water from House Carr Dyke pouring into the day hole. At the same time children working in the mine were trying to make their way out and 26 of them between the ages of seven and seventeen were trapped against a ventilation door and drowned. Their graves and a large memorial stone are to be found in Silkstone Churchyard. In 1988 on the 150th anniversary of the disaster a second memorial was dedicated near the site and this depicts two crouching figures of child mineworkers. This disaster was partly responsible for passing of the Mines Act of 1842 forbidding women and children under the age of ten from working in the mines.
- G The Beyer-Garratt engine (2-8-0+0-8-2, number 2395/69999 LNER Class U1) was a double engine built in 1925 for banking heavy coal trains on the Woodhead route.

Notes from CARE

This is a pleasant stroll, about 3 miles, or 3.82 with the side trip to the Huskar monument. Starting and ending at the Railway Station/Station Inn in Silkstone Common.

Stan and Grace: a Story of Love and War

Liz Whitehouse tells of her project to publish her parents' wartime letters.

The recent celebrations of the anniversary of VE Day and renewed interest in the Second World War made me think that readers of the Parish magazine may be interested in a project which I started in February, 2024.

Why February? Well, 82 years previously two young people met at a dance in Grimethorpe, on the other side of Barnsley. He was a soldier, conscripted into the Royal Signals, and she was a nurse, training in Nottingham. Both their families lived in Grimethorpe. They agreed to write to each other. My sister and I discovered the hundreds of letters they exchanged when clearing my mother's house more than 20 years ago.

The letters documented not only a developing love story, but also the effect of a world war on Stan and Grace's everyday lives. Grace's letters paint a picture of nursing in the 1940's and life on the 'home front' with the challenges of rationing and the other inconveniences of living in a country under siege. Stan's letters, although limited by writing under Army censorship, tell of his day-to-day life in the Army, of tedium interspersed with playing a part in momentous events. In 1943 Stan was sent to North Africa, taking part in the Sicily landings and Italian campaign.





Over many years I transcribed the letters and always intended to "do something" with them. In December, 2023 I was 69 and suddenly realised that if I was going to "do something" it needed to be now! I realised that the letters would lend themselves to being published in a blog.

The first letter was dated 12 February, 1942. I had never even followed a blog, never mind designing one, but I 'had a go' and the blog was ready for the first letter to be posted on 12 February, 2024. Letters are published on the same day that they were written 82 years previously.

Why not follow Stan and Grace through the Second World War? The letters are real life - not 'East Enders' - both exciting and mundane, full of hope, frustration and above all, longing.


