## James Harrop, Packhorseman, Carrier and Farmer.



In the early 1770s Thomas and Betty Harrop moved their family from Mottram in Longdendale to Silkstone. Thomas ran a successful business transporting goods between Barnsley and Manchester via the Woodhead Pass. Thomas Harrop also rented a very substantial farm near to Pontefract.

James Harrop was baptized in Silkstone in 1774 and at an early age was running his own packhorse train along the same route as his father before him. He made this regular journey for five years and famously described the condition of the roads as being "summat scandalous."

The packhorse route from Manchester ran down from Penistone through to Silkstone passing down to Packhorse Farm which also served as an Inn. Packhorse farm lay at the T junction just below Packhorse Green.

In 1792 James married Elizabeth Waddington at Silkstone church and they had several children the eldest being James junior who later moved to Glossop and established his own carrier business.

By the age of 21 James senior had set up as a carrier on his own account and was the first man to drive a stage wagon from Manchester to Doncaster. He also made two journeys from Barnsley to London losing three valuable horses on his second trip.

Life in the first two decades of the nineteenth century was very hard for ordinary working families. The Napoleonic wars had been very costly for the country then soldiers and sailors returning to their home towns and villages put a strain on local communities. The 1801 Enclosures Act took away the rights of villages to use common land for farming and grazing. The Corn Laws of 1815 made the cost of importing grain prohibitive. In times of poor harvests import duties made it too expensive to import grains from abroad. This pushed up the price of bread. In 1812 James Harrop had got into debt and was imprisoned in York Castle Debtors Prison. He later maintained that the charges against him were false.

Like Thomas, his father, James was literate and well educated. After reading an advertisement in The Leeds Mercury looking for 50,000 people to go out to the new Colony at the Cape of Good Hope James decided to apply. In August 1819 James wrote a letter on behalf of himself and eleven other Silkstone families applying to go out to the Cape Colony.

He cited problems of making a livelihood, false imprisonment, bankruptcy and illness. James stated that; "I have been assisted by the Town (parish relief) but their hearts are as hard as the nether millstone." He also complained that those who have fallen on hard times are "looked on worse than dogs." James also maintained "I care not where I go there is the same supreme in all nations but it seems as if England was still likely to be worse for some time except something could be done to better the conditions of the working class in general."

The families involved held meetings at the Red Lion to plan their journey to the Cape Colony. In any event it appeared that there were so many hurdles to overcome that none of the families made it to the Cape.

James Harrop was also a farmer and it appears that at one time the family rented Sunny Bank Farm which still stands on Silkstone High Street at the end of Towngate. He also rented nearby fields for growing crops and stabling for his pack animals.

There was also a dark side to James Harrop and several times from 1800 onwards he found himself in Court accused of theft and getting into fights. In June 1830 he found himself in Hull, declared insane and removed to a Refuge in Sculcoates. This period of insanity didn't appear to last long as in August 1830 he was declared cured and returned to Silkstone. Only one of James Harrop's sons remained in Silkstone. Thomas was a butcher and Innkeeper at The Six Ringers. He too got into debt to his spirit merchant then unable to pay his rent in 1867 Thomas was declared bankrupt.

In spite of the hard life James Harrop must have led, as a carrier and farmer, he lived until the age of 85 when he succumbed to a stroke and died on 17th November 1858 and was buried in Silkstone churchyard.

James Harrop was my four times great grandfather and if any reader believes that they are descended from the Harrop family I am happy to share my research with them.

## PLEASE DO NOT DUMP Old Pumpkin Lanterns in the woods - or anywhere else.

Hedgehogs will eat them (hedgehogs have a sweet tooth!) but sadly they are meat-eaters and eating a lot of pumpkin upsets their digestion, causing diarrhoea, which can result in dehydration and death.

Pumpkins are fine for Birds, squirrels, foxes and badgers. If you leave them out in your garden, please make sure they are off the ground so a wandering hedgehog doesn't get to them. But best of all chop them up and put them on a compost heap.

## Insect of the issue

There are a staggering 27,000 types of insect in the UK. We are expecting a bumper year for insects this Autumn as summer has been wet and warm!

So the insect of the issue this time is the well known Daddy Long Legs. Daddy longlegs (Tipula paludosa) is the most common of the 300 types of UK cranefly.

## Some facts

- Wingspan 20mm to 65mm
- Found throughout the U.K.
- Seen: June to October. Numbers of Craneflies peak in September and there is frequently an abundance of them after a wet summer. Wet soil is probably easier for larvae to move through as they feed
- Found on garden lawns and fields with short grass. Often find their way into houses.
- Adults feed on Nectar. Larvae feed on grass roots.

#### **Recognising them**

- they have long and ungainly legs, a long body and and erratic flight pattern
- they emerge as adults from lawns and grassland in late summer and mostly active at night
- they are not poisonous and cannot bite or sting

## Our back yard – 'Church Terrace' High Street, Silkstone: built 1872\_\_\_\_\_

I am very interested in the history of our villages, and how they have changed over time. With the help of Andy Horsfield and the Heritage Silkstone group I have been able to piece together some of the history of 'Church Terrace' High Street Silkstone, which is where I live.

The set of 5 Terrace houses 2 to 10 High Street Silkstone, are referred to in the book 'Our Isabel' (Isabel Hughes 1996 – courtesy of Heritage Silkstone). Isabel writes:

'Church Terrace was and still is an imposing row of five houses built in big blocks of grey Yorkshire stone, standing almost reverently between the church and the vicarage. To live here was certainly one up in those days.... In the front, facing the road each house has a small patch of garden, with a path leading up to the front door. Never any sign of life at the front, the net curtains always drawn and presenting a superior face to the rest of Silkstone'

The 5 Mining houses belonged to Mrs Fullerton, the lady from the big house, Noblethorpe Hall Silkstone, her father, Mr Clarke, was a wealthy land owner, owning most of the coalmines and other properties in the area. Mrs Fullerton was a keen Church goer and wanted 'good Church going people' to live in these set of houses, and so chose who should live in them.

#### Isabel writes:

'The backyard was where it all happened, the gossiping, the back chat, the arguments, the games, the bonfire, the falling out, the comradeship, the courtship, the laughing and the crying...'

I know that number 2 'Church Terrace' used to be Silkstone Post Office in and around the 1920's, and number 4 'Church Terrace' used to be the Telephone Exchange (with the large telegraph pole behind it). Isabel Hughes's Aunty Mildred and Uncle Fred lived at number 2 'Church Terrace' and they ran the Post Office from their front room – they had a telephone which would receive and send telegrams, sold stamps, postal orders, weighed

parcels – 'sealing them with red hot wax dripping from the lighted taper'.

Up until the 1930's at the back of 'Church Terrace' there were a row of four coal houses and alongside these where the outside toilets, a block of 3 toilets which the 5 houses shared (tin baths in the Kitchen). Later in 1930's, with modernisation, Water Closets were installed. Still no electricity.

When I moved into my house in 1998, No 8 High Street, Mrs Padgett lived next door to me at No 6. The Padgett's have lived in 'Church Terrace' since they were built in 1872.

As you can see (above) over the ages the 5 houses have outlived the Terrace houses opposite (which were in front of Silkstone Nursery). Opposite our houses there is Martin Croft, on all 3 photos you can see (above) Martin Croft was not even a Road, but literally a Croft, up until the 1940's.

The 5 houses started out with no front gardens, only a piece of land, and as time has gone by, different owners have

claimed their own front gardens, with big trees (sorry that is mine!)

## Have you heard of GHIC?

When we were in the European Union and you had holidays in Europe your UK European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) gave you some benefits regarding emergency health care in Europe. If you still have one of these it will still be valid until the expiry date on the card. However, once it has expired you will need to apply for a GHIC to replace it.

The **UK Global Health Insurance Card** (GHIC) lets you get state healthcare in Europe at a reduced cost or sometimes for free.

GHIC and EHIC do not replace travel insurance.

## Where you can use your GHIC (and EHIC if it is in date)

Visiting an EU country

You can use a GHIC or an EHIC if you're travelling to an EU country.

#### **Visiting Switzerland**

There are different rules for using your GHIC or EHIC card in Switzerland. To use your GHIC or EHIC in Switzerland, you must be one of the following:

- a British national
- a Swiss national
- an EU citizen
- a refugee
- a stateless person

 the dependant or survivor of someone with one of these nationalities or statuses

#### Visiting Norway, Iceland or Liechtenstein

You cannot use a GHIC or an existing EHIC in Norway, Iceland or Liechtenstein. You'll need travel insurance with healthcare cover.

You can use a UK passport to get medically necessary healthcare in Norway (for example emergency treatment, or to treat a pre-existing condition).

## How to apply for your GHIC on the NHS website:

Applying for healthcare cover abroad (GHIC and EHIC) - NHS (www.nhs.uk)

It's free to apply for a GHIC. Some websites charge to help you apply - these are unnecessary and you do not need to use them.

You will need to provide your:

- full name
- address
- date of birth
- National Insurance or NHS number (England and Wales)

...so if you are travelling to the EU make sure you have your GHIC!

## Silkstone Care Group Gets the Job Done - Eventually!!

## Yes, it's time for a MILLENNIUM CELEBRATION !

In 2000, CARE Leader Colin Bower and the Group decided to plant a Millennium Oak tree in Silkstone and one in Silkstone Common as part of the celebrations, and as a lasting reminder to everyone of the event. You probably have no idea where they are - or do you? Well, one is on top of the grass area at the side of the vehicle entrance to Silkstone Primary School and the other is at the corner of Hall Royd Lane and Beacon Close in Silkstone Common. It was agreed that the trees would be given a while to settle in to ensure the root ball had taken properly before any further action to identify them was taken.(A third oak was planted at the same time at the request of the Vicar in the churchyard of All Saints Parish Church).

Time passed and things moved on. They are now well established trees and finally in January 2014 efforts began by a retired member to recognise their significance by fixing a small plaque next to each one. NINE years later, permission has at last been granted so next time you walk around the villages take a look.

### So why now?

It seemed a nice way to say a big "THANK YOU" to every CARE Group member. Over the years so many people, both young and older, have given their time and effort to help make our villages such pleasant places to live.

CARE began many new projects, all of which have enhanced the villages in so many ways, thanks to the efforts of so many volunteers. To name just a few examples Orchard Wood, Station Gardens and Oueen Elizabeth Gardens are major projects but it is the continuing commitment to smaller projects and their maintenance that has transformed the villages. We should also recognise the regular support of the Parish Council and grants from other sources including Woodland Trust, Barnsley Glass Recycling, Northern Rail, Penistone Round Table and many others - even Harrogate Flower Show, who supported the opening up of Jays Wood in Silkstone Common.

## **CARE and Orchard Wood**

By the time you read this we should have finished work re-instating and improving the footpath and steps in Orchard Wood leading from the Moorend Lane entrance.

We have worked closely with the Parish Council (in the guise of Stewart) to get the gate repaired so that people with push chairs/mobility scooters etc can more easily get into the wood. We have also reinstated the path up to the steps, making it a bit wider as well so that it is easier to use. And finally we have widened and improved the steps. There is now a handrail, the steps are also shallower and there is an extra step which we hope will make them easier to use.

We hope that people with push chairs and mobility issues will at least be able to get into the wood and up to the first bench as a minimum. We know this has also made the wood more accessible to people on bikes as well, It is now easier for them to get through the wood to the TPT at the bottom of Black Horse Drive. We ask them to be courteous to other users and to not damage the steps by cycling up and down too enthusiastically!

Finally we have used some left over road planings to improve the surface of a section of path which becomes incredibly muddy when there is heavy rain.

The road planings came from improvement work on the Hoylandswaine bypass, so they have travelled as short a distance as possible. Steve and Tom deserve a **mega thank you** for organising and coordinating supplies and getting things in place so the rest of us could shovel, rake and whacker the planings down. We couldn't have done it without their meticulous planning and preparation.

Also Penistone Ward Alliance deserve a thank you - it was a grant from them that enable us to go ahead with this project.



### **Canon Keith**

Our Vicar, Canon Keith, has recently been named as one of the new Deputy Lieutenants of South Yorkshire.

Keith is the Vicar of the Benefice of West Barnsley which are the parish churches of All Saints' and St James the Great Silkstone with Stainborough, St John the Evangelist, Hoylandswaine, St John the Baptist, Dodworth and All Saints', Cawthorne.

The office of the Lord Lieutenant issued this statement in August:

'New Deputy Lieutenants Appointed Five respected individuals have been named as Deputy Lieutenants of The County of South Yorkshire. The role of a Deputy Lieutenant involves supporting and deputising for His Majesty's Lord-Lieutenant of South Yorkshire, Prof. Dame Hilary Chapman. Duties may include attending Royal visits to the county, representing the Lieutenancy at ceremonial events such as Remembrance Day and citizenship ceremonies and any other duties that the Lord-Lieutenant may ask to be undertaken on her behalf. Appointment to this position is by the Lord-Lieutenant, subject only to The King not disapproving of the granting of their commission'.



HM Lord-Lieutenant, Prof Dame Hilary Chapman said:

### **Photography at Barnsley U3A**

In May, following requests and suggestions from Barnsley U3A members, a new photography group was launched. Bu3a had two experienced members available and willing to become group leaders and offered their skills to start two different, but similar, photography groups which best matched the requirements and expectations of the members. Peter Higginbottom leads the 'Photography and Image Manipulation' group and Brian Crossland leads the 'Photography: Know Your Camera' group. Both groups meet every other week and details can be found at <u>www.bu3a.org.uk</u>

After spending the summer months getting to understand some of their camera settings by taking photographs of ornaments, toys, moving objects and other common household things and experimenting with a range of camera settings, members now see that moving on from 'full auto' to start taking control of their cameras is quite straight forward, helped by encouragement and many opportunities to discuss what's actually happening.





No matter what technology you use, creating a photograph is generally a 4 stage process:

- seeing the image you want to make (bearing in mind that our eyes and cameras see differently),
- capturing the scene on your camera (involving much more than simple 'point and click'),
- making your captured image look like the one you think you saw (eg - image manipulation),
- presenting or displaying your final photographic image (as a printed photo or digital screen/TV).

From September, the 'Know Your Camera' group is planning a series of photo-shoots at local venues, building on a recent visit to Monk Bretton Priory, just across the road from the regular meeting place at Priory Campus, Lundwood.

The intention is to alternate between the photo-shoots (weather permitting) and

indoor sessions, providing everyone with photographs to share, discuss and consider further development and things to try as they get to know their camera.


