Tits, Blackbirds, Robins, Magpies and Long tailed Tits have stayed the same as last year's count. However, Great Tits and Wood Pigeons have increased in numbers; but sadly Goldfinches and Starlings have decreased in numbers.

We also have a new regular article from Matt regarding Gardening and Garden Design (Matt has recently been involved in the Chelsea Flower show); and from Julie information about the local W I – it is not just about jam making and sing-alongs at the W !!

Silkstone – St Florent Twinning Association

Silkstone is Twinned with St Florent des
Bois in the Vendee, France. The village of St
Florent des Bois is 14 kilometres south of
La Roche sur Yon, about 25 km from the
Atlantic coast resorts of Les Sables
d'Olonne, La Tranche-sur-Mer and
L'Aiguillon-sur-Mer and 60 km north of La
Rochelle. It is a beautiful area to visit.



The formal twinning agreement between Silkstone Parish Council & The Municipal Council of St Florent des Bois was signed during a visit to the Vendee in 1991. On 2nd May 1992 the agreement was ratified when a delegation from St Florent des Bois came to Silkstone for the first time.



The aim of the Twinning Organisation is to promote friendship and the understanding of each others traditions and ways of life. Friendships have been formed over the years as bi-annual visits have taken place, alternating between Silkstone and St Florent des Bois. Some of our people have been involved in the organisation from its inception, visiting the Vendee and hosting our French friends on their trips here. Others have participated on an ad hoc or one off basis. My husband Ross and I hosted a French couple on the first ever visit here and though we remained in contact exchanging Christmas cards etc

(their son spent 3 months with us whilst he completed an internship towards his engineering degree in 2009) it was not until 2017 that we made a return visit, taking part in the twinning trip to the Vendee.




Sadly Covid brought a halt to twinning activities in 2020. It had been hoped that our French friends would visit Silkstone this July. That trip has had to be postponed until 2025


when it is planned that a delegation will come, probably in the second week of July. As during previous visits, a full programme of activities will be arranged for our visitors and any local residents who wish to participate.

It is anticipated the group will number between 24 & 30 and will include about a dozen young people (who are supervised by youth workers). Host families are needed to accommodate our guests and if you have a spare bed/ put you up we ask that you consider taking part by welcoming a French guest into your home. It is an ideal opportunity to develop your language skills (though it is amazing how much you can communicate with very limited French) and make new friends.

Between now and July 2025 we hope to arrange a series of events for anyone interested in finding out more about the Twinning Organisation. The first of these, a cheese and wine afternoon on Sun 2 Junewas advertised on the community facebook page. Please look out for other events and come along. We have made good friends in Silkstone Parish as well as the Vendee by participating in twinning & have thoroughly enjoyed the hosting experience and the two twinning trips we have made to the Vendee. Over the next three Silkstone Parish Newsletters we hope to share information about the visits here by our French partners and our trips to the Vendee.

Last year the Hanging Baskets which are individually sponsored looked wonderful throughout the villages.

The Parish Council own 13 Allotments which are currently rented out to Allotment Holders. The demand for Allotments is still high and any vacant plots are taken up quickly as soon as they become vacant.

The Husker Rooms are well used and offer a wide range of activities, Yoga, Pilates, a dance school, scouts, brownies and a good number more. It is also a venue for birthday parties, these are a just a few events which are provided. There are two vacancies to help run the Husker Rooms and if you are interested please speak to Richard Leech or Richard Bell.

Silkstone Luncheon Club still meet regularly every Monday and are a lifeline in helping our older residents meet up with others. They meet at the Station Inn, Silkstone Common, if you need a lift to the pub they run a minibus around the parish. They have a good mix of people from both villages, and they have a meal provided by Mark and Julie who run the pub.

The Good Companions meet every other Wednesday at the Methodist Church in Silkstone Common, The have a variety of events throughout the year, days out, a number of guest speakers, details of these are found in the Parish Newsletter.

Last year I organised the Summer Fayre held in Silkstone Common with help from Sue Williams and Janice Wake. On the day Parish Councillors came to help, Richard Leech, Sue Williams, Richard Bell and Janice Wake

Our thanks go to the Scouts for providing food and drinks in spite of the hot weather. Thank you to the Maria Penrose dancers who put on a wonderful display of their dancing skills. Thank you also to Old Silkstone Band for entertaining us with their music.

The Parish Council held a raffle and the money raised from the raffle was £218 with the proceeds being split between Silkstone Common Good Companions and Silkstone Luncheon Club.

It was a lovely sunny day and well attended. I would like to thank all the stall holders and the people who attended to help make it such a success.

The Neighbourhood Development Plan after a number of years was finally agreed and signed off by Barnsley Metropolitan Borough Council. Thank you to all those who worked on it for such a long time, a lot of time and effort was given to bring the NDP to a conclusion. Our thanks go to lan Turner, Alan Thompson, Debra Smith, Meryl Liddell, Derek Liddell, Janice Wake, Sue Williams, Helen Willows, Paula McDonald, Jill Hayler and Louise Kirkup. This will help the two villages in the parish develop in a way that residents want to see.

We have a new challenge this year in that the Parish Council would like to purchase the Methodist Church, if it is feasible. There is a lot of work to be undertaken, the main one being the securing of funding to raise

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money for the purchase and repair work within the building and undertake refurbishment of the building. We will need people to help us achieve this goal. If the Parish Council were to acquire the building it would become a Community Hub for all residents and with activities for everyone.

We look forward to our next year and all that it brings.

Biodiversity in crisis?

Biodiversity is the term adopted to describe our natural living world and in line with Councils across the country the Parish Council recently established a Biodiversity Policy. The policy aims to protect, enhance and develop our natural environment as leading wildlife/environmental organisations evidence serious issues with the state of wildlife, plant and tree species across the UK.

The National Trust, RSPB, Wildlife Trusts, The Woodland Trust and others all point to loss and decline in wildlife numbers and species to alarming extents.

A recent Webinar from Yorkshire Local Councils Association reinforced this state with loss of habitat, use of pesticides, changes with climate/weather patterns, litter/plastic pollution being some of the standout reasons.

Our recently adopted Neighbourhood Development Plan gives some safeguards around, for example, the protection of our green spaces along with building standards that are environmentally focused. So can we as residents have an effect on the well being of the nature around us?.....

A few suggestions from the organisations above include:

- Adopt "no Mow May" (could be June and July!!) and leave lawns and verges to grow and provide food and habitat for insects and birds
- Plant a row of Wildlife seeds in gardens that attract Pollinators, vital for plant and tree well-being and growth.
 Particularly for bee population under threat from various sources.
 Alternatively plant "bee friendly" flowers in borders and planters
- Reduce tree, shrub and hedge trimming levels to increase safe habitats for birds
- Avoid/reduce single use plastics whenever possible
- Avoid using pesticides

In themselves not big actions.... But added up can have marked effects on protecting and enhancing our local Biodiversity

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



We also have regular creative sessions, in March we created a spring door wreath, in April we did a fresh flower arrangement and an interesting art project in May!



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Gardening with MattB

The garden is a fascinating place in which you are linked to nature, plants and people.

The last few years have shown how much we need this connection, whether the garden is ours, borrowed or visited. I am sure all of us are fortunate enough to connect to a space we call our garden, whether indoor, outdoor or as part of our community, if not, get involved!

Here we will explore gardens, their connections and relationships and how we, as gardeners, can use and learn about these to enjoy our gardens to their fullest.

Plants

Let us start with plants, the lifeblood of gardens. Plants green our world, fill it with flowers we cherish and bring a wealth of benefits to gardens.

Despite an often-difficult rep, there are two simple truths about plants; 1. They are tolerant and tough and 2. They like friends.

Plants have accommodated themselves to this world over millennia and adapted to the specific places they inhabit. When they are happy, they spread, how often in the UK's glorious natural landscape do you see bare, open soil? Hardly ever.

A gardener's first rule is therefore simple: just take a little time to find out where a plant likes to live, and plant it accordingly, right plant, right place.

The second key Gardener's, or now Garden Designer's, rule is that plants love friends,

lots of friends. So, where you have soil, plant densely (around 8 per m² for perennials).

There are a few elements to consider for a harmonious group.

Relationships

Think about which plants will be good friends. Consider: how each plant grows, to ensure they won't fight over space; how they reproduce, so they won't seed everywhere or send out long roots. Think about the heights of plants so they won't smother each other and check that they all like the same conditions. Doing this will ensure they form a healthy community. This takes practice and is a never-ending process of experimentation, something to relish and enjoy.

Aesthetics

Think about aesthetics, how these plants relate in a visually pleasing way. You can consider colour, texture, form, height and flowering time. Restraint is key here, choose a few varieties which will give interest all year and plant them in multiples. Again, experimenting with combinations is a must.

Working with these relationships will build a beautiful space with year round interest.

The benefits don't stop there: a dense border helps build soil quality, retain moisture, suppress weeds and create biodiversity; you get a stunning array of

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
plants, attract and help critically important wildlife - and you won't have to crawl about looking for weeds.

With only a little knowledge you can really use plants to your advantage. Now it's summer, it's not great for your water bill to plant swathes of plants. So, for now: look and take note of any areas that are bare, think about what plants might grow well there. You could try planting up a pot with a sample of your ideas, then, if you like it, apply it to the garden.

Finally, get inspired by visiting some of our fantastic local gardens such as the Hepworth at Wakefield, RHS Harlow Carr or York Gate garden. Take note of the plants used and where they are positioned in the garden. Then keep that knowledge for next time, where we can put it into practice.

Enjoy!

In collaboration with the parish council CARE have drafted an action plan which supports the PC policy and hopefully will increase biodiversity in both our wonderful villages.

But what is biodiversity? Basically it's all the different kinds of life found in one area. From birds, bugs, plants, fungi. What we don't know is how to measure what we already have and how our interventions are going to improve things.

Do you know how to measure biodiversity? Please get in touch.

The areas CARE will work on include:

- Leaving some grassed areas uncut for insects
- Increase the number of bird boxes each year
- Develop habitats for bugs
- Maintain and increase the number of whittle fences we have

- Native planting only where practicable, removal of invasive species
- Sustainable planting which takes account of our changing climate
- Carry out regular litter picks, and involvement with Keep Britain Tidy initiatives
- Disposal of our green waste sympathetically
- Limit our use of herbicides

We will review our action plan every year.

Diary of a Country Parson....

(with acknowledgement and due respect to the famous diary written by Parson Woodforde in the 18th century!)

I'm in a reflective mood as it dawns on me that it is nearly two years since being inducted as the Vicar of West Barnsley. The ceremony of induction has changed little over the past few hundred years, including swearing allegiance to the Sovereign and the Lord Bishop, and taken to the main door, holding the handle, to promise to maintain decent and Godly worship.

It is at this point that the Church Wardens, one of the most ancient offices of the Church of England, hand over the inventory of 'church treasures and ornaments' and a full set of keys. I was considerably weighed down by the keys for four churches! The Vicar is then taken to toll the bell and alert the parishioners that the new incumbent has arrived to offer them pastoral care, in the ancient words used, 'the cure of souls'.

Underneath all the pomp and ancient wordery lay the essence of the job – pastoral care. I realise that I am one individual taking my place in a long and ancient line of clergy reaching back nearly a thousand years. The privilege of this is never lost on me.

Recently the gravestone of a past priest in Silkstone was uncovered. His name was Thomas Peigham and he was inducted as vicar in 1677 and without doubt he would have experienced the same ceremony I did. A real sense of history and continuity! On

his gravestone are written the words, 'Ecclesiae Pastoris' – Church Pastor. It's a worthy thing for a priest to be remembered for. On mine it may say, 'Here lay the remains of Canon Farrow who expired during one of his long sermons. Thanks be to God!"

I don't know what Parson Peigham's day to day life was like but for me there are never two days the same. All of us are affected by the speed of communication. Rev Peigham would have thought it fantastical that we would be carrying in our pocket a device that would bring instantaneous communication and the ability to give information about anything from boiling an egg to sending a rocket to the moon! (I'm still at the boiled egg stage so Rev Peigham need not fear).

A tribute to our Fred Walshaw 1917 – 1944 and the Anniversary of the Normandy Landings 6th June 1944

As the country marks the 80th anniversary of the Normandy landings on 6th June 1944 this is the story of one of Silkstone's sons who fought in Normandy but didn't return home.



Fred Walshaw
was born in
Silkstone on
13th October
1917 the son of
Fred and Martha
Walshaw. Fred
worked as a
miner but in
August 1937 he
joined The Duke


of Wellington's Regiment but the following May he was discharged 'ceasing to fulfil army physical requirements'.

At the start of World War 2 in September 1939 Fred was living at 1 Pack Horse Green with his parents and older brother. All three men were working as miners.

In October 1940 Fred enlisted into the 5th Battalion Coldstream Guards and about the same time married Bertha Hastey. The following year Fred and Bertha had a son. Fred was later promoted to Lance Corporal.

Thanks to the 5th Battalion's war diary it is possible to trace what happened to Fred after they landed on Gold Beach on the

Normandy coast on 25th June 1944. The battalion fought their way inland and on 21st July they were involved in heavy fighting at Frenouville, 5 miles from Caen where Fred was killed in action. Initially buried at Frenouville Fred was eventually re-interred at the Commonwealth War Graves Cemetery at Banneville-la-Campagne. The epitaph on his headstone reads. 'Only those of loved and lost can understand war's bitter cost'. Left a young war widow with a young son, Bertha must have been devastated at the loss of Fred.



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Last June David and I toured France and Belgium for three weeks visiting many of the 1st and 2nd world war CWGC military cemeteries. Visiting the Normandy beaches we stopped at the Banneville-la-Campagne cemetery to pay our respects to Fred Walshaw and to leave a RBL wooden cross on his grave on behalf of Silkstone village.

We also visited the 2021 British Normandy Memorial at Ver-sur-Mer and found Fred's name on one of the memorial pillars.

As with all the CWGC cemeteries the one where Fred lies is beautifully kept. We were also gratified to realise just how much the French honour and respect our war dead.


