#### **More Vandalism**

It is with a heavy heart I must report again more vandalism in Orchard Wood, when challenged the youths were not only abusive at the time but, also behaved threateningly later in the day causing the incident to be reported to the police.

When youths decide to dig holes in the woods and create mounds to turn the woods into an unofficial off-road track for bikes, this makes the area unsafe for many of the parishioners who wish to use the wood for relaxation and nature watching.

# Damian's citrus red onion marmalade

Here is fantastic accompaniment to make at this time of year. It can be made well in advance and will taste better after it has had a week or so to stand and develop. It is great with cheeses and chicken liver parfait. Make this now, ready for Christmas.

The colour and spices are autumnal, and when you make it, the house will smell fantastic.

# **Ingredients:**

- 3 red onions, sliced
- 4 table spoons brown muscovado sugar
- Around 4-5 tablespoons red wine or malt vinegar
- 1 cinnamon stick
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 table spoon honey
- 1 orange, juiced and zested

#### Method:

Slice the onions and soften in a pan with butter. Cook for around 10 minutes, until golden and sticky.

Add the remaining ingredients and simmer until the mixture has become sticky and reduced in volume.

Tip into a clean and sterile old jam jar (boil a kettle and fill the jar with the water, stand for a minute, and then tip out the water. Add the marmalade straight away)

Allow the mixture to cool down in the jar, once cooled add the lid and store in a cool place. The marmalade will last weeks.

I do hope you enjoy my recipes and try them at home. This one develops flavour, over time and so is great made now, ready for over the Autumn and Christmas period.

Hello, my name is Mina and together with Jacqui I run Tiny Tot's Toddler group on a Friday morning at the Huskar Rooms behind Silkstone garage. We start about 9.15am and finish at 11.15am.

The group was set up in 2016 with the view to support local parents & carers giving them somewhere to go with their children where they can socialise with other like minded people.

I used to find toddler groups a bit intimidating so our aim is to make everyone feel welcome and comfortable.

We provide toys and every week we do a focused activity (which you are free to join in if you wish). Activities range from drawing, decorating biscuits, making snow globes and themed activities. We have story time, ball time and song time.

Tea and coffee for the adults and a snack and drink for the children are included in the price.

We have a small soft play area and an area for babies.

There is a play kitchen, a dolls house, bricks, garage and cars, piano, dressing up box, baby dolls and ride ons.

We have a variety of toys to suit each child and age group which allows them to explore and try new experiences.

I am a mother and a childminder and Jacqui is a foster carer who specialises in working with disabled children so together we have a wealth of experience which we can share.

Sometimes parents and carers are unsure about where to get information and we see the group as a way of everyone sharing their experience and helping one another.





# **Homes for Birds**

Nine new nest boxes were made and put up around Silkstone Common, care of the CARE Group, this Spring.

Following a series of talks and demonstrations to the very interested and animated children of Silkstone Common Infant & Junior school, three boxes were put up in Orchard Wood, watched by the school. Three more were put up in the Silkstone Common Recreation Grounds and three others attached to houses in the village.





The Robin box wasn't used, and the Swift boxes remain empty - but all-in-all a very good season and, perhaps, up to sixty extra Blue or Great Tits are around today, because of these boxes.



Following this success, it was decided to make more nest boxes to raise money for the CARE Group at the Summer Fair. This not only benefits the CARE Group, but of course will add further to the number of available nest sites around the village. I'll continue to make to order too. A Tawny Owl box and a Little Owl box are also ready to go up locally.

Also, I'm now volunteering as a Ranger for the National Trust at Stainborough Castle, as their wildlife man - I've got a site for the Tawny Owl box there - so I'm excited at the prospect for the environment locally.

I hope this will inspire some new poetry for the next edition. Watch this space!




# Beacon Close, Silkstone Common

Working with permission of the landowners, Berneslai Homes, Susan and Gill of the Silkstone CARE Group have been working over a number of weeks to spruce up the area around Beacon Court. The CARE Group provided four new planters, compost and a number of plants and shrubs making it a beautiful and peaceful little oasis for the residents and others to enjoy. Ongoing work will include more planting in the borders around the Close.



# **Restoring The Waggonway**

In July Silkstone CARE Group along with one of our longstanding members and Chair of the Roggins Local History Group, Jim Ritchie, approached the Parish Council with a plan to restore a stretch of Silkstone Waggonway which had fallen into disrepair. The Parish Council not only agreed with the plans but actively sought funding which was successfully provided by the Penistone Ward Alliance. The restoration was successfully carried out at the end of August with the help of Groundwork -Barnsley, and overseen by Silkstone CARE Group volunteers. This restoration ensures this former horse drawn railway, originally built in 1809 to convey coal to the canal basin at



Barnby, Cawthorne can be enjoyed for years to come.

### **Towngate Flowerbed**

We have also started a rejuvenation of the large stone flowerbed on the junction of Towngate and High Street in Silkstone with Silkstone with CARE Group members Karen, Ian and Keith weeding and planting a number of new shrubs and herbs. We will maintain it and plant further shrubs throughout the coming year.

The idea is to plant more herbs and establish a small communal herb garden for residents to pick for their own culinary use as they pass by.

# The Cross – Flowerbed Competition

Work has also started on rejuvenation of the large flowerbed at The Cross. We have planted a number of temporary shrubs and plants in the bed to keep it respectable over the autumn and winter period.

In the next issue of the magazine we will be launching a competition to come up with a masterplan for the Cross area and the flowerbed, still incorporating the coal wagon, to ensure we are making the best creative use of what is an important and highly visible 'gateway' and open space for the Parish.

Councillor John Wilson has generously agreed to provide a prize for the design winner.

#### Silkstone Summer Fair

The Group also had a stall at the August Silkstone Summer Fair where our plant sales, tombola, bird box and bird food sale, and guess the contents of the sweet jar helped raise over £200 of much needed funds. We also cohosted a book stall with cookery, garden and wildlife books which raised money for Barnsley Hospice. Many thanks to all who purchased items and made donations - they will go directly to improving the environment of both our villages — and to the volunteers who gave their Saturday up to help.

# Get the Firelighters Ready, and the Corkscrew!

As we near the end of the warm months of summer, we can sit back and reflect on lazy afternoons spent sipping chilled Rose and crisp White Wines, enjoying light meals of Seafood and fresh salads. Summer is many peoples favourite season, but Autumn brings its own culinary delights to tempt the taste buds and has a real identity in the food and drink business.

Our best-selling white wine by far is our Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc, however during the Summer here at the Bells we discovered a large increase in people choosing our drier Pinot Grigio Rose instead of the sweeter Zinfandel or more traditional white wines. The Pinot Rose is delicate and slightly floral but incredibly refreshing with a very low acidity and paired very well with our Sea Bass and Chicken Dishes.

The chefs have enjoyed the Summer as well with some experimental specials.

We have seen Lobster, Sea Trout, Cod Loin and Thai style Crab Cakes to name but a few, and they also had a chance to showcase their talents during our two Wine Pairing evenings which were both a tremendous success and which we will be hosting again.

Coming into the blustery Autumn it won't be long until the log burner is lit, and we will see a transition from White to Red as people choose the cosy comforts of deep reds and heavier, warming meals such as Braised Beef Cheek and homely stews. Autumn also brings with it the joys of Game Season, so expect to see some classic game dishes on our new menu including Venison. When the reds come into play, our stunning Argentinean Malbec is a personal favourite, it is full bodied and velvety and intensely deep red, pairing excellently with any red meat



dish. That being said, our customers are spoilt for choice with beautiful Chilean Merlot, Spanish Tempranillo and Italian Primitivo (similar to Zinfandel) varieties to choose from amongst others on our wine list.

So get wrapped up and enjoy the Autumn months, sit back by the fire with a large glass of red and take a breather, because Christmas will be around the corner before you know it!

Whilst Charlotte was at the Jamboree, many of the group helped at the Under The Stars festival at Cawthorne. This was the 6th year that Scouts have been involved, running a food stall for the campers and ensuring that the site was kept clean. We received much praise from attendees at the festival, who took their time to tell us how good it was to see the young people doing such a good job and working so hard.



Then the highlight of the summer, was when 14 Scouts and 2 leaders travelled to Saint-Florent-des-Bois in France to take part in their twinning celebrations. The Scouts flew from Liverpool to Nantes, before being transported by

During our stay the Scouts visited a tree top adventure park, a huge waterpark, participated in an international sports tournament as well as attending the twinning ceremonies where the Scouts were honoured to plant a Yorkshire rose bush in the gardens of the Mayor's house. The exchange provided an

excellent opportunity for the young people to experience French culture and make many international friends. In today's Social Media led society, the young people can maintain their friendships by the click of a button and it is hoped that an exchange can be arranged for the young people of Saint-Florent to come and stay at Silverwood.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Twinning Society, particularly Yvonne Dinsdale and Mimi in France who without them the trip wouldn't have been possible.



All the Scout sections start back this week, with a program of activities for the term up to Christmas. Their next event will be in a few weeks time when we will be going to Alton Towers – camping on the lawn next to the lake, before having a full day's activities in the park.

# Why we need a Neighbourhood Plan

# What is neighbourhood planning?

Neighbourhood planning gives communities direct power to develop a shared vision for their neighbourhood and shape the development and growth of their local area. They are able to choose where they want new homes, shops and offices to be built, have their say on what those new buildings should look like and what infrastructure should be provided, and grant planning permission for the new buildings they want to see go ahead.

# What can communities use neighbourhood planning for?

Local communities can choose to:

- set planning policies through a neighbourhood plan that forms part of the development plan used in determining planning applications.
- grant planning permission through Neighbourhood Development Orders and Community Right to **Build Orders for specific** development which complies with the order.

Neighbourhood planning is not a legal requirement but a right which communities in England can choose to use.

#### What are the benefits?

Neighbourhood planning enables communities to play a much stronger role in shaping the areas in which they live and work and in supporting new development proposals. This is because unlike the parish, village or town plans that communities may have prepared, a neighbourhood plan forms part of the development plan and sits alongside the local plan prepared by the local planning authority. Decisions on planning applications will be made using both the local plan and the neighbourhood plan, and any other material considerations.

# Winter Gardening with Emma Horsfield from Horsfields Nursery, Pot House Hamlet

Often when you buy a house you take on a garden. Usually in the taste of the previous owner, sometimes this can be wonderful; other times at best this can be unsatisfactory. When buying a new house, you can start from scratch, plan carefully and have a colour scheme. The colour scheme in my first garden was white, cream and green. I decided to keep it simple and stick strictly to it for maximum effect.

For our wedding we decided on a colour scheme of cream, greens and whites, very similar to my first garden but I feel they are very effective when planted on mass. Rather than cut flower table arrangements, I used potted indoor house plants to make an arrangement in a watering can. In these arrangements I used white orchids, ivy, ficus, and spathiphyllum (pictured) which all complemented each other well.

Outside in your garden, summer colour is easy for your colour scheme. There are many beautiful white roses, such as Iceberg, Tranquillity, Pearl and Polar Star. White and cream climbing roses look good over an archway such as Filipes Kiftsgate, Wedding Day and Rambling Rector (pictured). One could mix this in with the evergreen clematis Armandii, Jasmine Officinalis, or Trachelospermum Jasminoides, all of which have white perfumed flowers. All summer bedding and hanging basket plants come in myriad of colours so it's very easy to keep within your





Colours for spring are easy to find too. The large cupped white daffodil Mount Hood is beautiful and very tall about 35cm in height, planted in groups this looks fabulous. Bridal Crown (pictured) is a highly perfumed double flowered daffodil. The small white Narcissus Thalia is good for an exposed windy position too. Tulips come in many different colours; my garden has the creams and white of Purissima and white emperor, both large varieties, 35cm in height. For

windy spots, concerto is good, and about 15cm tall. There are many other spring flowering bulbs too for your colour scheme.

Winter flowering in colours is often thought to be a little harder, however in white there are snowdrops, hellebores, heather, evergreen azalea, Camellia and even rhododendrons which are ideal. The Sarcococca Hookeriana Humilis (pictured) flowers white with perfume at Christmas too. Don't forget berries come in different colours for Autumn, the Sorbus has white or red or yellow berries depending on variety.



So, don't just think of a colour scheme for indoors, why not give it a try in the garden, or start with a few pots filled with matching colour.
