Huskar Pit Disaster — Can you help?

The tragic loss of 26 lives

July 4th this year marks the 180th anniversary of the Huskar mining disaster that took the lives of 26 children aged between 7 and 17 working underground in Huskar Pit.

Silkstone Parish Council, Silkstone Common Methodist Chapel, All Saints Church Silkstone, the 2 Primary schools and local interest groups are joining together to commemorate this tragic loss and are planning a number of events and activities whilst establishing gardens as memorials to the lost souls and their families.

Over a 5 day period, starting with a memorial service near the Huskar mine in Silkstone Common on 4th July and at All Saints in Silkstone through to concluding with a reception and Service at All Saints on Sunday 8th July (Continued on page 2)

there will be exhibitions and displays at each Church, drama and poetry writing in the schools, along with a Victorian sports day at Silkstone Common School.

Music and Choirs will feature at both Churches and there will be remembrance boards and flowers for each of the lost children displayed at All Saints.

As lasting tributes 3 gardens are being planned ... a Victorian flower garden in Silkstone Common Primary, a Labyrinth garden is Silkstone Primary and one in the grounds of All Saints that will feature vegetables grown at the times of the disaster. In addition a walking trail will be signposted from Huskar mine to Silkstone village.

So much to do.... gardens to be built, drama and music to be rehearsed,

presentations to be prepared to cover the history and life in Victorian 1830's and so much more.

A working group across our Community has come together and is busy producing a programme of events and planning activities. There is lot's to do, volunteers needed to help with the preparations and on the days and fundraising so we can ensure we mark the 180th anniversary in the best way possible.

Updates on the Commemoration will be made over the coming weeks through Parish notice boards, Parish Council website, information sheets at the 2 schools and village outlets and The Chronicle.



This Is Not a Flower Festival It's A

Large Display of Flowers to Commemorate the 180th Anniversary of the Huskar Pit Disaster 4 July 1838

The Church of All Saints and St James the Greater Silkstone with Stainborough are to commemorate the 180th anniversary of the Huskar Pit Disaster which occurred in a day hole in Knabbs wood Silkstone Common, with the loss of 26 children, boys an girls aged between 7 -17 years, who were drowned when a freak storm forced the nearby stream to break its banks forcing water to enter the day hole entrance.



A large flower display depicting the tragedy will be assembled in the North Aisle of the church, and flowers arranged for the 4 July 2018. The cost of each individual arrangement will take in proportionate cost of construction, oasis, shrubs, flowers, candles etc.

We are seeking potential sponsors for the arrangements; we hope it may be of interest to you?

Previous similar events have been of great interest and were viewed by over 2000 visitors on each occasion. I will be your contact and I will produce and coordinate the display, which will be arranged by Worsbrough and District Flower Club, who are members of the National Association of Flower Arrangement Societies.

It is our intention to support Kimbilio's work within the Democratic Republic of Congo, of street children. Boys and girls, who have often travelled thousands of miles, often to find work in horrendous conditions, an example being the mining of cobalt and lithium.

Damian's Gin & Tonic Cheesecake

At the moment gin is very fashionable and after visiting numerous gin festivals, over the summer, decided to flavour my own at home. I've now made raspberry, rhubarb, blackberry, lemon and elderberry. All totally different and very refreshing. I therefore want to incorporate gin into my cooking and baking. We have tried gin and tonic cupcakes, and now wanted to try a cheesecake. Hope you like this recipe and give it a go at home.

Ingredients

- 120g melted unsalted butter
- 200g Digestive biscuits
- 500g cream cheese
- 30g icing sugar
- 50ml gin
- Zest from whole lime, juice from half the lime
- 110g white chocolate pieces
- 300ml double or whipping cream

For the topping

- 160g lemon curd
- 2 tbsp gin
- Lime slices used to decorate



Method

Grease an 8" cake tin and line it with grease proof paper/parchment.

Bash the biscuits until they are like breadcrumbs (use a rolling pin and a plastic bag), combine with the melted butter and then tip into the cake tin. Press and firm down and then chill.

Using a large mixing bowl, beat together the cream cheese, icing sugar, lime zest and juice and the gin. Use an electric whisk if you have one.

Melt down the chocolate in a bowl, sat over a simmering pan of water. Stir all the time and don't let the water touch the bowl or go into the chocolate, as this will spoil the texture of the chocolate. Once melted and smooth, allow it to cool a little and then stir it into the cheesecake mix.

Whip the cream until its floppy and thick and then combine this into the cheesecake mix. Tip this onto the biscuit base, level off and then chill it down. Overnight is best, to get a firm set texture.

When the cheese cake is set up, remove from the cake tin and sit it on a cake stand. Combine the lemon curd with the gin and spoon or pipe over the cheesecake and then arrange the lime slices.

New Trees planted at the Huskar Community Rooms



As part of National Tree Week Silkstone CARE Group with the local Silkstone Beaver Group planted around 40 new trees, including four large fruit trees, in what is to be the new picnic area adjacent to the Huskar Community Rooms on Saturday 25th November.

This was part of the Parish Council's bigger plans for rejuvenating and maintaining Conroyd Wood and the surrounding area and was in part funded by grants from The Tree Council, the Postcode Local Trust and Silkstone CARE Group.

What we do

We work closely with our fellow volunteers in Silkstone in Bloom and Silkstone Common in Bloom, Silkstone Parish Council, Barnsley MBC and Northern Rail to manage and maintain the natural assets we have within the Silkstone Parish. This includes looking after three woods – Conroyd Wood in Silkstone, and Orchard Wood and Jays Wood in Silkstone Common – maintaining the Station Gardens in Silkstone Common, the upkeep of public spaces including Hillside, 'Bernard's Place' and The Chestnuts in Silkstone, caring for over 20 planters

and flowerbeds and undertaking regular litter picks across both villages.

We also organise and manage educational environmental projects and have worked with both Silkstone Primary School and Silkstone Common Junior and Infant School and our local Beaver, Scouts and Brownie groups.

Become a volunteer with CARE

Silkstone CARE Group is a group of volunteers which was established over 30 years ago and who care for their local environment. Anyone and everyone can join us, although children and young people under the age of 16 need to be accompanied by a responsible adult.

You can attend when you want for as long as you want. We generally meet two Saturday mornings a month between 10am and 12noon and occasionally do litter picks during the week in both Silkstone and Silkstone Common.

There is no formal membership process or training to go through, although from time to time we offer training in various aspects of woodland maintenance when funding allows.

We provide all the tools and equipment needed, although you can bring your own if you prefer.

Signs of spring accelerate and soon the summer visitors will be arriving back from Africa – radio-tracked Cuckoos are being monitored on their long journey north already – listen out for this increasingly rare visitor in May and June – by July the adults will be returning south again!

I've registered to take part in the National Three Peaks Challenge in September to raise money for the mental health charity, MIND.



Although I try to keep fit, walking a few miles a day with my dog, the MIND trek up Ben Nevis, Scafell and Snowdon in around 24 hours will require a massive increase in fitness. My training has begun and I'll be taking the challenge with Kathryn Smith and Helen Simms, who both completed a 40-mile trek for MIND last year. As well as the trek we'll be fundraising with a live music evening, a classical music concert and a Ceilidh each including a raffle.

I need to raise at least £775 and am aiming to reach £1000. You might wonder why a busy vicar, wife and mother would choose to take this challenge?

My reasons are simple – having had first hand experience of mental health problems myself and my family, and also often supporting people affected by the mental illness of family members, I realise the massive impact mental illness has on individuals. I also realise how difficult it is for people to get help with the NHS.

The NHS is trying to improve the support it offers but Voluntary organisations such as MIND are often the only direct access support available to people in mental health crisis. They all of which depend on voluntary giving and charity fundraising to enable continuation of their vital services. I was lucky to be able to access support when I most needed it but I realise there are huge numbers of people with deteriorating mental health who will rely on organisations like MIND for the help they need.

Please help me raise as much as possible to help MIND continue offering an lifeline to those suffering from fragile mental health.

150 years of Methodism in Silkstone Common

Prior to 1868 Methodists from Silkstone Common worshiped at the Primitive Methodist Church in Silkstone. At this time the Common was thinly populated, but the opening of new pits and the coming of the railway led to population growth. Services were held in cottages, and public meetings with teas took place in a barn at Hill Top where funds were raised. In September 1868 the foundations of the new Primitive Methodist Chapel were laid in Silkstone Common and in December the Chapel was opened. The building cost £207 11s 2d.

In 1874 the accommodation for young people was found to be inadequate and a Sunday school was built alongside the Chapel. The latter has long since disappeared, but the old chapel was converted into a private house, (the last property on the right hand side of the road leading towards Oxspring and Penistone). The Primitive Methodist plaque, which was over the door of the Chapel, can still be seen.

In 1914 it was decided to build a new Chapel and schoolroom in the centre of the village and fundraising commenced. It was hoped to commence building in 1925 but the cost was found to be too high and the scheme was abandoned. However, in 1930 a New Trust was formed and the foundation stones on the new Chapel were laid in August 1930. A large crowd saw this event as evidence by the fact that a 'sit-down' tea was served to upwards of 300 folks! The closing service at the old Chapel



followed on 12 April 1931 and on 18 April 400 people processed to the opening of the new Chapel, built at a cost of £2,600. It is interesting to note that the plaque over the entrance says simply 'Methodist Church' as the opening was just prior to Methodist Union in 1932. Does this make it the oldest 'Methodist' Church in Britain?

In 1968 when the centenary of the Chapel was celebrated there was a flourishing Sunday School and choir, and services were held each Sunday morning and evening. The Whit Walks and Christmas carol singing in the village brought the Chapel to the village. Over the 50 years since that time there have been many changes. The village has grown in population, though losing many amenities. Many more leisure time attractions and sporting activities mean young people no longer are attracted to Sunday School and working families seem to

have less time for Sunday worship. The congregation though aging, strive to maintain a welcoming place for worship and a warm welcome is offered to all who wish to join them. In the absence of a village hall the Chapel is much in demand as a meeting place for a very wide range of regular activities. We are the home for Mother and Toddler groups, a Sharing Skills group, the Ladies Choir, Old Silkstone Band, over 60's, Good Companions, Martial Arts and Pilates classes.

To Mark the 150th anniversary celebrations we have planned a concert by Old Silkstone Band on Saturday 23 June and a service followed by tea on Sunday 24 June at 3pm. The preacher will be the Reverend Mick Neal, Superintendent of the Barnsley Methodist Circuit. We hope to see many residents at these events.



The Tour De Yorkshire is coming....


On Friday 4th May the cycling spectacular, which is the Tour de Yorkshire, will be passing through Silkstone.

With over 130 riders from a record number of team entries and support vehicles it will be an amazing opportunity to witness this International event as the race passes through the village before it continues on to Penistone, so what do you need to know about the event?

The Route:







Key Information:

- The race will be leaving Barnsley Town Centre between 1.30pm and 2pm and is expected to reach the Silkstone area within 15mins of starting.
- The route will be subject to a legal temporary traffic regulation order (TTRO) to close the roads on a rolling closure – Police Outriders will enforce this and should arrive between 20 and 45mins in advance of the race.
- The legal order will also feature a prohibition of parking order for the entire race route, which means <u>no</u> onstreet parking will be permitted—1 hour prior to race arrival we have kept this period as short as possible to minimise disruption, however <u>all residents and</u> <u>businesses</u> will be required to move vehicles to an alternate location during this period.
- BMBC enforcement teams and South Yorkshire Police will be patrolling the route throughout the day to ensure compliance of the TTRO.
- All road and parking restrictions will end once the race "bubble" has passed and networks will return to normal.

Trying to Keep Silkstone Common Green

It's surprising what you can do when the chips are down. One January morning notices went up at Moorend advising us that Barnsley Council planned for fifty houses to be built on a Green Belt meadow in front of our houses. More homes are certainly needed, but the Council's original plan was to build them in Barnsley itself, and in the more urban areas. We've since learned that all Councils have to get their Local Plans approved by the Government and it was a Ministry appointed planning inspector who wasn't happy with this first plan. She told the Council to be 'more positive' about villages like Silkstone Common and find housing sites there.

All of us living here moved to Moorend because of the glorious countryside and the views over the open Green Belt land. We were shocked to learn that it could be built upon, and that we only had until the 12th of March to object. We had some experience of 'chipping in' to solve problems, as we'd done just that to share the cost, along with the Council, of tarmacking the pot-holed lane to our houses. We did the same to fund a planning consultant to advise us on the most effective objections to lodge. We got organised, formed a community group, shared jobs out and got door knocking.

Our initial reactions were maybe NIMBYish, but the more we learned the more convinced we were that the Council's original plan was right. It was clear straight away that others in the village weren't keen on seeing our Green Belt

disappear. Many were worried about traffic and the lack of facilities in the village to support another 50 homes, lots worried about the effect on wildlife.


Some people from South Yorkshire buildings joined us and we adopted the name 'Keep Silkstone Common Green'. A public meeting to share what our planner advised saw around 150 people attending and lots of information about the site and its history emerged. More very good grounds for objecting were suggested. So far around a hundred objections have been lodged, which we feel is a great result.

In the last few days it's emerged that a developer wants to build 150 to 200 new houses on a site on Knabbs Lane, between the Equestrian Centre and the Trans Pennine Trail. Clearly planning is going to become a major issue in the village.

All our meetings have been fun and those of us who've become involved know each other much better as neighbours. And speaking of neighbours, we know a lot more too about the birds, bats and insects that live alongside us. 
