Jay's Wood And Hall Royd Colliery

Over the last two or three years or so the Silkstone CARE Group have spent a considerable amount of time in what is now called Jay's Wood which ,if you're not familiar with, is along Hall Royd Lane to the north of the village. Hopefully some of you reading this article will have visited the wood and enjoyed the peace and tranquillity that you found there. For those of you who haven't as yet visited spring and hopefully better weather are just around the corner so the next few weeks might be a good time to do it.

Most of you will have heard of the Huskar Pit and the disaster that went along with it but what you may not be quite so familiar with is that Jay's Wood was once the site of another colliery in Silkstone Common, the Hall Royd Colliery which operated from 1861 to 1928. Peace and tranquillity would have been the last thing you would have expected to find back in the days when the colliery was working. It would have been a noisy and dangerous place to be. This article from The Penny Illustrated Paper from 29th January 1865 illustrates just how dangerous a place it could be:

Fatal Colliery Accident

Three Men Killed

Last Saturday afternoon an inquest was held at the house of Mr Gaunt, Silkstone Common (Junction Inn now The Station Inn) before Mr Taylor (Coroner) on the bodies of William Hebblethwaite, aged twenty two years, Thomas Walton aged twenty and William English aged fortyfour who were killed the previous day in a shaft being sunk by the proprietors of the Hall Royd Colliery at Silkstone Common. Mr Morton the Government inspector who was present said the accident was the most singular that he

Old Silkstone Band News

After just a few years, George became Principal Cornet during one of Ireland's most successful periods which saw them progress from the 4th to 1st section in our league tables in just 4 years, no easy feat. Aged 15, he moved to Thoresby Colliery Band and then in 2016, George was appointed Principal Cornet once more, aged just 19; he was one of the youngest principal cornet players in the band's history. Now, he is currently Principal Cornet with the Hepworth Band, one of the Yorkshire Regions best bands.

Whilst studying Materials Engineering at Loughborough University, George still remained active with his musical commitments and as a result he was awarded the Loughborough University Music Scholarship in 2016, out of many talented applicants. He also enjoyed playing trumpet with Tuxedo Swing and Nottingham Jazz Orchestra. Whilst at university, he also made the short trip every week to Nottingham to play with the University of Nottingham Brass Band and for his last 2 years at university he became the conductor of the band! He enjoyed many successes as conductor, including, being twice winner of the Yorkshire and Humberside Contest and 2 top 6 finishes at the Unibrass contest, just to name a few.

The band have had approximately 2 months under George's baton so far and are thoroughly enjoying the challenge and reward he is providing.

recollected in his experience. Messrs Haynes and Lawton were sinking to what is known as the four-foot bed and the lowering and pulling up is performed by a small engine of about two horse power which was under the management of Hebblethwaite whilst the other two men killed were sinkers. By some means the former got entangled in the head gearing, fell down the pit (depth about 50 *metres*) and was so much injured that he died in about an hour after being brought out of the shaft. The other two men, contrary to rule, got into the 'trunk' which is only made to carry one person and having reached the top some part of the machinery slightly gave way and the 'trunk' having lowered some four or five

yards, it is supposed they clutched at each other to save themselves and were precipitated to the bottom and killed. The death of the three men is purely attributed to recklessness and departure from the rules by those whose safety they were framed. At the conclusion of the evidence the Coroner briefly addresses the jury and they returned a verdict of 'Accidental death'.

If you do manage to visit Jay's Wood sometime in the near future please give a few thoughts to the three men who went to work that particular Friday back in 1865 but never got the chance to return to their homes.

New homes in Silkstone Common!

During springtime, a possible house move is sometimes on the agenda. This is also the case for our local wildlife who may wish to move house!

In early February, on a calm, sunny, bright morning, it was a pleasure to work with the Silkstone Care Group in Jays Wood, Silkstone Common. The team were carrying out general maintenance, a litter pick and installing bird and bat boxes in the wood along with a superb Owl house! These handmade, purpose built properties make ideal residencies for a range of local species. All the work that the group carry out in the wood is aimed at creating habitat for insects and wildlife using sustainable material from the wood itself.





On a wider issue, as local Councillors we are using our share of £250,000 which is being used for a 'blitz' on weeds and a general cleanliness effort across the borough. This is aimed at making a visible difference in our communities.

Another initiative which will have a positive impact on our environment and help to achieve our zero carbon objectives within the council is a programme of tree planting in as many locations as possible. Over the next few years, we will be working with the Parish Council to see this programme grow and develop. It will be very important to ensure that we identify species of trees which are good for the area.

We have been particularly successful at introducing fruit trees in some areas which are proving very popular with both children and residents alike.


Another team which make a visible difference in our area are the Twiggs Penistone Area Clean, Green and Tidy Team. They carry out a variety of environmental works across Silkstone and Silkstone Common, at times working with the CARE team.

Whilst working with our Twiggs Team and other volunteers in Silkstone, I was interested to hear that we hope to start using a new method of killing weeds without the use of weed killer! This relatively new technology uses hot water to control weeds by delivering water at low pressure consistently at 98 degrees centigrade to kill the root. Over time this will prove to be a much lower cost in controlling weeds, unlike conventional weed killer with little detrimental impact to the environment.

This is the type of development we can be happy with!

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
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Silkstone Common Christmas Tree

Cat Rescue Silkstone & Silkstone Common

Did you know that Silkstone and Silkstone Common are at the heart of **RSPCA Barnsley & District's cat rescue** efforts?

RSPCA cat coordinator and trustee, Jackie Siddall, manages a team of local volunteers who all care for the many abandoned and homeless cats and kittens in Barnsley, and the wider area.

"Each year we rescue, rehabilitate and re-home between two and three hundred cats and kittens, all within the homes of our lovely and caring volunteers, in the Barnsley borough alone. Some kittens are very poorly and need a lot of care - most though are healthy and fun from the start. Very young kittens without their mums are especially vulnerable and need roundthe-clock feeding and lots of vet care. No-one enjoys doing 2-hour feeds through the night, but the reward of saving tiny baby kittens is worth it."

Whilst volunteers offer their time and space for free, food, litter, vaccinations, neutering and other (sometimes hefty)



vet costs add up to a big bill. The RSPCA is so grateful to the many people who raise funds, give generously and give to designated cat food and litter donation bins at supermarkets. A special thank you is due to Tesco's Penistone and Stairfoot, Morrisons at Barnsley and Cooke's Pet Store for their support.

Last year, inspectors rescued kittens that were found in a box outside a vets, some terrified in a car engine, in a house with a hoard of 24 cats and kittens; hiding behind bins on a cold night; abandoned in a house when someone moved out; feral kittens left starving when Mum was run over. Each and every one found a new and loving forever home. Some of



our kittens travel a long way - even to London, Kent, Dorset and Scotland.

RSPCA Barnsley is always looking for more fosterers - we provide all food, litter and vet costs. Our volunteers provide the love, cuddles and hard work.

Kitten season will start soon – generally cats breed from spring to late autumn but this is starting to spread now to all year round.

We always have cats, and usually have kittens, desperately looking for new homes. Maybe this is your year to adopt a new member of the family?



Damian's slow braised pork with potatoes and olives

Its nearly new potatoes season and here is a tasty dish to try this seasonal ingredient (serves 5)

Ingredients

900g shoulder of pork, trimmed and diced
500g new potatoes, cut in half
50g black olives
40g green olives
500g tomatoes, or use tinned tomatoes.
2 tablespoons olive oil
2 medium onions, peeled and sliced
1 large red pepper, deseeded and sliced into 1¼ inch (3 cm)
strips
2 cloves garlic, peeled and chopped
1 heaped teaspoon chopped fresh thyme, plus a few small
sprigs
280ml red wine
2 bay leaves
salt and freshly milled black pepper

Method

Pre-heat the oven to gas mark 1, 275°F (140°C).

First, skin the tomatoes: pour boiling water over them and leave them for exactly 1 minute before draining and slipping off their skins, then roughly chop them.

Now heat 1 tablespoon of the oil in the casserole over a high heat, pat the cubes of pork with kitchen paper and brown them on all sides, removing them to a plate as they're browned.



Then, keeping the heat high, add the rest of the oil, then the onions and pepper, and brown them a little at the edges – about 6 minutes.

Now add the garlic, stir that around for about 1 minute, then return the browned meat to the casserole and add all the thyme, tomatoes, red wine, olives and bay leaves. Bring everything up to a gentle simmer, seasoning well, then put the lid on or cover with foil and transfer the casserole to the middle shelf of the oven for 1¼ hours.

After that, add the potatoes, cover the pan again and cook for a further 45 minutes, or until the potatoes are tender.

Marking VE Day in our villages

May 8th is a national Bank Holiday to mark the 75th anniversary of VE Day. For several months, a group of representatives from the Parish Council, Heritage Silkstone and the two churches have been meeting to plan events to take place over the anniversary weekend.

Over the past year some members of Heritage Silkstone have been researching life in the parish during the Second World War. They interviewed several men and women who were either children or young adults when war broke out in September 1939.

Silkstone Primary School loaned their school log books so the historians were able to discover how the war affected the village children. They also discovered that as the war progressed all three schools received a number of evacuees from the south of England.

Based on war time memories, school logbooks and residents generously sharing photographs and stories of their relatives Heritage Silkstone were able to discover what life was like during the war. All this research has been put into a display and it is also intended, with the help of the Parish Council, to publish a souvenir booklet. All are warmly invited to visit All Saints church over the VE75 weekend to view the display and pick up one of the booklets.

The VE weekend also will include several events and services in and around the church. On VE day itself, there will be a short act of remembrance at 10:45am at the war memorial in Silkstone, after which the church will be open for refreshments and viewing of the Heritage Silkstone displays. Later that day, at 7pm, the church bells will ring, joining with belltowers across the country marking this historic date.

On Saturday 9th May, the church will be open from 10am until 3pm, during which time refreshments will be available and members of Heritage Silkstone on hand to answer any questions.

At 3pm on Sunday 10th May, there will be a thanksgiving service at All Saints Silkstone, led by clergy from both the Methodist and the Anglican churches, after which a scrumptious afternoon tea will be available accompanied by music from the 1940s.

It is hoped that the thanksgiving service and afternoon tea will be well supported and everyone, young and old will be most welcome as we celebrate the gifts of peace and community.

Update on the Neighbourhood Development Plan

The last newsletter reported that we had set up a steering group to make progress on a Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) for the Parish. The steering group has met four times since October, and we felt now was a good time to explain a bit more about the task ahead of us.

The idea of NDPs is that they give local people a greater say in planning decisions that affect their area. Barnsley Council already has a local plan and other documents with policies to guide the development of the borough. The NDP complements those documents with policies at the neighbourhood level and is designed to reflect the needs and priorities of the local community. Unlike earlier documents produced by the Parish Council, the policies in the NDP must be considered when Barnsley Council takes decisions on planning applications in that area.

NDPs can identify where development should take place, set out local design principles so that buildings respond positively to local character, and protect important facilities, historic buildings, the natural environment and open spaces. However, the NDP cannot contradict policies in other statutory planning documents, both for Barnsley and nationally, so we must consider these as we prepare the NDP policies.

The steering group has agreed a Draft Vision for Silkstone Parish up to 2033 as the starting points for the NDP: "To maintain the character of the villages by ensuring that any development is sensitive to the existing built and natural environment but recognises the need to support 21st century living in a sustainable way."

From this draft Vision, we currently have eight (again draft) Objectives, providing themes for a range of NDP policies:

- To support the development of housing provision to meet local needs that is in keeping with the character of the surrounding area.
- To support the protection and improvement of community leisure, sports and recreation facilities.
- To protect, enhance and develop the Parish's biodiversity, natural assets and amenity areas, including the Trans Pennine Trail, the green belt, green open spaces, open farmland, and community allotments.
- To protect and enhance the Parish's built industrial and residential heritage and history.
- To preserve and improve accessibility and connections to the Trans Pennine Trail, the Wagonway, local beckside, local footpaths and bridle paths.
- To support the development of a sustainable local economy, with particular emphasis on maximising local tourism assets.

- To better manage local traffic to reduce highway congestion and increase road safety
- 8. To support better access to local public transport networks

The next piece of work is for the steering group to develop the Vision and Objectives into an Issues and Options document. We are working with Kirkwells consultants on this document together, setting out what we suggest the NDP should include. This will then give something on which local residents and businesses and other stakeholders can give their views and add their own ideas. We hope to kick off this process with a consultation event the date will be announced and promoted across the parish. We will be providing updates on the "Your community" section of the Parish Council website and publishing the steering group minutes with the Parish Council papers, so you can find up-todate information there.

Spring Gardening with Emma Horsfield

Now all the excitement of the snow and the freezing conditions are over one needs to think about brighter times ahead and more colour for the garden. One of the main ways to achieve this is sow some seeds. Seed sowing can be very satisfying, and producing your own plants from seeds also helps to keep costs down. There are so many types and varieties of seeds available on the market that, for beginner gardeners, the task of choosing them can seem quite daunting. However, fear not! Firstly, one needs to decide how many seeds to buy; this is determined by how much room you have in your garden or allotment, and how much you'd like to give away to your neighbours and friends. When choosing seeds it is always worth buying good quality from a well know stockist, and don't forget to check the sell by date.

Sowing the seeds is the easy bit, germination is the harder. I'm going to concentrate on seeds that cannot be sown directly outside but need warmth to germinate. Decide what container you wish to sow your seeds into, I like to use small plastic fruit punnets as they are easy to manage, and fit four to a shallow seed tray. Make sure that the punnet is clean. I use a little diluted Jeyes fluid to

disinfect. The punnet also needs to have drainage holes in the bottom. Fill your punnet with compost, rubbing it between your hands so as to aerate and to make sure there are no lumps in it, Levington F2 is a very good seed compost. Smooth the top of the compost, and firm with a piece of board, then use a watering can with the nozzle turned upwards to slowly soak the compost evenly. With the compost thoroughly wet, sprinkle the seeds, gently onto the compost, the coverage depending on the variety of plant, add a fine covering of perlite, then put somewhere dark and warm (approx. 65 degrees) for them to propagate. A plastic bag can be used if you don't have a propagator. This can take anything from 5 days to 3 weeks. Make sure you label them clearly.

The ideal place to propagate seeds is on heated sand on a mist bench in a heated greenhouse. Obviously, this is not always possible, so on a window ledge often works well. I remember as a child my mother cleaning out our airing cupboard for trays of seeds to go in to germinate. A small propagator can be a good investment. The seeds need to be misted regularly so a mist gun full of tap water a few times a day does the trick, depending on the moisture conditions. Once the seeds have popped up, make sure they are somewhere with plenty of light. Let them grow to a couple of centimetres and then you can prick them out into a larger container, and when they are large enough, into a hanging basket, tub, or window box, garden bed etc. depending on the weather conditions. For those that have over produced, don't throw them out, be generous and give them away!

Some seeds are a lot easier to germinate than others, for example bidens, brachyscome, dahlias, diascias, marigolds, tagetes, nemesia, nicotiana are good to begin with. Impatients, lobelia, begonias and geraniums need a little more attention, and if the conditions are not perfect, don't take it personally, a lot of people have the same problem.

If all this seems too much for you, buying your seeds in small ready germinated punnets, I call them 'time savers', is always a great idea.

Litter problem or not??

You may recently have seen the yellow signs on the slip road joining the M1 North at junction 37, they indicated how many bags of rubbish had been collected, 20 bags and, a sign a little further up the slip road encouraging motorists to take their litter home.

It made us wonder ... how many bags of rubbish do we collect in our villages? So, from 1 January this year we have been counting the bags of rubbish we have collected across both villages. In January we (CARE members) collected 23 bags of rubbish. This excludes any collected by the handyman employed by the Parish Council or any litter collected by residents. In addition, there were three specific reports of fly tipping in January.



We don't know if this is a lot or a few, hence we are collecting the data and we will be able to see any trends in the volume of litter. What we have noticed in this short time is that the main problem areas are the routes in and out of both villages, plus Cone Lane, the road that links us. We assume that the majority of this litter is being dropped from moving cars, not necessarily always residents in the villages. Everyone is encouraged to adopt a "Please Take Your Litter Home" approach.



However, what is more upsetting is the continued volume of dog waste which we are seeing in both villages, either bagged and left or not even bagged. This is a further plea for dog owners and dog walkers in our villages please deposit your dog waste appropriately, it really isn't anyone else's responsibility to clean up after your dog.

Reduce, reuse and recycle

Following a recent tour of the BDR (Barnsley, Doncaster, Rotherham) Waste treatment facility at Manvers, we've had our eyes opened to actually what happens with our grey waste, and how positive this is. One statistic which amazed me, us was 4%. After all our grey waste has been through their processes, only 4% of it goes to landfill. Our grey waste goes through multiple processes and even the plastic which we previously thought went to land fill can be recycled. Following the visit we learnt that we should be more careful about what plastic goes into the brown bin. The more "pure" this is the better and reduces the problem of bad plastic contaminating good plastic. Top tip, read the label carefully and don't worry about putting plastic into the grey bin, due to the volume handled by the BDR facility it can still be recycled.

Other interesting stats for the BDR facility

- The plant processes 240,000 tonnes of waste from 340,000 homes across Barnsley, Doncaster and Rotherham
- Over 90% of waste is diverted from landfill
- Waste is taken to Ferrybridge which contributes to generating electricity to power over 160,000 homes

The mantra at the BDR plant is Reduce, Reuse or Recycle – is this something you can embrace? Just imagine a handful of small changes in every one of our homes the positive impact we could have. Take a look at www.WasteLess-SY.co.uk Waste Less South Yorkshire provides advice and guidance for people across South Yorkshire about all things recycling and waste reduction. They are a passionate bunch ready to provide simple yet innovative ways to reduce waste at home.

Local Recycling

Did you know that you can also recycle some items which would have ordinarily gone into your grey bin? There are four black bins in the grounds of the Methodist Church which collect sweet wrappers, dental products, crisps packets and pet food pouches. These are collected by a private company and are used to produce the soft ground often found in children's play areas. It's easy to do, just keep them to one side and every now and then drop them off into the respective bins.

And did you know? That CARE receive cash from the glass which is recycled in the large bins provided in The Station Inn car park in Silkstone Common and those in the car park of The Red Lion in Silkstone. Please consider using this facility rather than putting your glass in your brown bin – thank you.

Embrace Transport Service

What is Embrace Transport Service

We are a specialist NHS neonatal and paediatric critical care transport service hosted by Sheffield Children's NHS Foundation Trust and based in Dodworth. Our dedicated teams move newborn babies and critically ill children between hospitals by road and air ambulance, so that they can receive specialist care.

The aim is to transfer children from Yorkshire and the Humber while providing the same high standards of care that they would receive in a specialist hospital.

Embrace work in partnership with Yorkshire Ambulance Service NHS Trust,who provide 4 specialist mobile intensive care ambulances and one rapid response vehicle.

One of our key partners is The Children's Air Ambulance (TCAA), a charitable provider of two state of the art AW169 helicopters specially designed to transfer newborn babies and children. It is this aircraft that will be landing in Silkstone to pick up or drop off our teams close to our base in Dodworth. This landing site will become a vital part of our work transferring patients a long distance for specialist care.

Embrace aeromedical service

We have carried out 2 patient transfers where the helicopter has landed at Silkstone:



23 December 19 we landed in Silkstone to collect our team and equipment for a transfer between Oxford to Doncaster. 27 January 20 we landed at Silkstone to collect our team and equipment for a transfer between Grimsby and Wigan. The team and equipment were returned to Silkstone at the end of the transfer.

The helicopter transfers ensure the patients receive a speedy transfer to the correct specialist hospitals and receive excellent care during the transfer.



Safety culture

Embrace has developed strong clinical governance structures focusing on safety and quality:

- Fully accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Medical Transport Systems for critical care transport by ground, rotary wing and fixed wing
- Regular review of transfers and flights
- Joint safety meetings with flight providers
- Incident reporting management

What is the role of Embrace?

Most infants and children can be cared for close to home in their local hospitals, however there are some for whom this is not possible. Embrace provides a single point of contact by which clinicians caring for these infants and children can access regional services, get advice and arrange transfers.

When a plan involves moving the infant or child to more specialist care, the transport consultant and nurse coordinator decide upon the makeup of the transport team to provide the best possible care during the journey. This will depend on the level of critical care that the infant or child requires. The sickest children would have a team consisting of a transport consultant, middle grade doctor or Advanced Nurse Practitioner working with a transport nurse and ambulance driver; a more routine transfer may involve a transport nurse and a driver.

On arrival at the referring hospital the Embrace team take a handover from the referring team before assessing the child. The child can be moved onto the transport equipment once the team are satisfied that the patient is stable. The journey can then begin. Wherever possible, Embrace encourages a parent to accompany their child during the journey. On arrival at the destination hospital the child is handed over to the receiving team and moved from the transport trolley into an appropriate bed or cot for their ongoing care. Once the transfer has been completed the Embrace team will liaise with the base to determine the next task to be completed.

We are grateful to the people of Silkstone in supporting Embrace and The Children's Air Ambulance.
