This frightening scenario is occurring because the planning inspector rejected BMBC's local plan. As such, it has now become obvious that we need to progress the development of our neighbourhood plan. If we wait for the planning inspector to review and comment on the revised local plan then we could end up not having any say on the developments that take place in our parish.

The process to get a neighbourhood plan involves a lot of hard work in reading, researching, meetings, information gathering, analysis and much more. We need to form a working party to undertake this task but it must be people who have the tenacity to see it through to the end.

This may be two or three years. You will need to have a parish-wide view and not just be interested in a local issue. Some people who have already expressed an interest will be contacted but if you feel you have the interest and the determination to complete this task please get in touch.

The neighbourhood plan is not about preventing development but is a statutory document that allows us to say how any development progresses in our parish. Please give this request a lot of consideration and if you have any special skills or experience that would help in creating our neighbourhood plan, please get in touch.

You can help hedgehogs by


- putting out wet cat and dog food (preferably in some sort of covered box that a cat or dog can't get into)

Now we are into the Wedding season many ladies and indeed gentlemen start to think of flowers and colour schemes. This can be a very pleasurable or stressful experience. Every Bride or Mother of the Bride has been planning and forming ideas from early on. I recently went to a wedding where the flowers were just red roses and a little greenery in the way of different types of Ivy. I was most impressed with the simplicity and indeed the effective striking display of this monotone plan.

On the other side of the coin, attending many weddings sometimes second or third weddings, you have to ask yourself; what do you give the couple that have everything....?? Going back to the flower scheme; why not a rose. I have yet to meet anyone that does not like roses. Their shape, colour, form beauty, perfume etc is so wonderful, the list is endless. A rose bush can squeeze into that small space in the corner of the garden or in a pot on the patio. A rose comes into flower each year during the wedding season to remind the happy couple of their special day. There are so many modern hybrid roses with relevant names such as Bride, Wedding day, Happy Event, Honeymoon, Special Occasion and many many more.

Of course the rose is my favourite flower, as a child during the summer our house (Rosefield House) was always filled with highly perfumed large hybrid tea roses and old English roses which my father Tom used to bring from the rosefield as a romantic gesture for my mother Clare. Needless to say they have many roses in their garden which bloom every summer reminding them of their special day.

Reminders for summer

- Liquid feed baskets and tubs twice a week
- Dead-head roses, this encourages a new flush of blooms
- Keep nipping the tips out of your herbs to encourage bushy growth
- Prune early large flower clematis to encourage a smaller flush of flower in autumn.
- Mow the lawn on a regular basis
- Regularly dead-head container and basket plants
- Feed roses to encourage more flowering
- Keep supporting and training climbers

Damian's wild cherry and almond crumble tart

Yes I suppose I'm a bit of a forager and I'm always looking for free fresh ingredients to cook with. (blackberries, sloes, apples, elderflowers and berries etc)

Last summer I couldn't resist the beautiful cherries that were growing in abundance in Cawthorne park. You need to pick the deep purple coloured cherries, they are a little tart and do need sweetening when you cook them. I prepared a wonderful nutty crumble that worked really well with this fruit. Serve with a jug of chilled cream, or icecream.

Serves 4-6 portions

Ingredients

- 350g Cherries –de-stoned and washed
- 100g Sugar

Crumble

- 300g Plain flour
- 75g Ground almonds
- 70g Sugar
- 200g Butter

(You can adapt the sugar content to suit your own taste, reduce it down if you like the fruit really tart)

Method

Combine the flour, butter, sugar and almonds until the mixture resembled bread crumbs. Ensure you have no lumps of butter left in the mixture.

Now take half and spoon it into a pie dish, press it right down and it will form a kind of pastry base. Place the fruit and sugar on top and then loosely sprinkle the remaining crumble mix on top. The idea of the base is to help you serve and portion it up as it almost forms a pie or tart.

Bake the crumble at 180°C for around 30 minutes, we chefs don't really time things, so check it and once it's nice and golden then it should be cooked through.





Hatches, matches and dispatches

I'm sometimes asked what the rules are regarding who can be married or baptised in our churches and who can be buried in our churchyard. I'm also aware that there is some misinformation circulating which can result in missed opportunities and disappointment, so I hope the following information provides some clarification.

Marriage in church.

A couple can marry in one of our churches if you can show that one of you:

- has at any time lived in the parish for a period of at least 6 months, or
- was baptised (christened) or confirmed in the parish concerned, or
- has at any time regularly gone to normal church services in the parish church for a period of at least 6 months or
- if you can show that one of your parents, at any time after you were born:
 had lived in the parish for a period of at least 6 months, or has regularly gone to normal church services in the parish church for a period of at least 6 months, or
- if one of your parents or grandparents was married in the parish.

If you cannot demonstrate any of the above connections, you could create a connection, simply by attending your chosen church's usual services at least once a month for six consecutive months.

Baptism (Christening)

Anybody of any age may be baptised in our churches and a vicar cannot refuse baptism to anyone living in the parish. We welcome all those seeking baptism, and if someone living outside the parish wishes to be baptised in our churches they simply need to make an application, but should also, out of courtesy, inform the vicar of their

home parish that the baptism is taking place elsewhere.

Baptisms may take place during the main Sunday morning service, or separately at another time, should mornings be difficult for families or guests. The clergy person conducting the baptism will usually visit to go through the service and meet the family. When children are baptised the church usually keeps in touch with parents to let them know when special services, such as "Messy Church" are taking place.

Funerals and burials

Our clergy are always available to conduct funerals, either in church or at a local crematorium. The rules regarding burial and interment of ashes in churchyards have recently been revised in the Chancellor's General Directions and churches are required to adhere to these rules.

Every parishioner (together with those whose names are entered on the church electoral roll, and those dying in the parish) has a right of burial in the graveyard of the parish, provided there is room.

Other persons may be buried only with the consent of the vicar, which should be given or withheld in accordance with general guidance given by the Parochial Church Council. Please note that the burial plot is not owned by the next of kin of the deceased, but remains in the ownership of the parish priest.

A specific area (The Garden of Remembrance) within the churchyard is set aside for the interment of ashes and the same rules apply as for burial.

There is no right to erect a headstone or other memorial on a grave. The vicar has discretion to authorise the erection of any headstone, which falls within the types and classes permitted in the Chancellor's General Directions.

There are also regulations governing what can be placed on a grave or ashes plot. These are as follows:

- bulbs and small spring flowering plants may be placed in the soil of any grave;
- plants or cut flowers may be placed in a removable sunken container (of an unbreakable material, preferably unpolished aluminium) in the soil of any grave;
- wreaths and cut flowers placed on graves and plants and flowers in containers may be removed, when withered, by those authorised to do so by the vicar;
- other objects, including railings, chippings, pebbles and similar materials, statues, keepsakes, solar lamps or similar, toys and other mementoes are not permitted on a grave.
- 5. any artificial flowers placed on a grave may be removed when they become damaged or faded.

I hope these notes are helpful; should you have any additional queries, please contact the church wardens or one of the clergy, who will be happy to assist.



The Huskar Rooms continue to go from strength to strength, the group who manages the rooms are proud of the successes they have celebrated over the last twelve months. The rooms boast a wide range of activities including yoga, craft, a dance school, scouts, brownies and many more. It is also a successful venue for birthday parties, hog roasts, BBQs to mention a few of the activities.

Looking forward, next year will hold new challenges and the Parish Council will continue to work hard to ensure the best outcomes for Silkstone Parish. A massive challenge will be the new data protection legislation due to 'go live' at the end of May 2018 the General Data Regulation Protection (GDRP). This is European legislation that will affect every Council, group or business that holds any information about anyone and how it stores and uses that information. The Parish Council is already working hard to be ready for when the new legislation goes live and to be compliant to it at all times

One of the main projects will be the writing and approval of a neighbourhood plan. This will need to be consulted on with as many parishioners to make sure the content is what the parish wants. The parish council will be hoping to recruit a band of volunteers to help and support the development, writing and issuing of our new neighbourhood plan. Finance Report by the Parish Clerk and Responsible Finance Officer

The total precept (Parish element of the Council tax) for the Parish for 2017/2018 was £70,365 with a council tax support grant of £4,635 giving a total income to the Parish from Barnsley MBC of £75,000.

Barnsley MBC paid this to the Parish Council at the end of March rather than beginning of April 17 which has meant that the precept is shown in 16/17 accounts.

For summer 2018 there will be even more baskets thanks to high demand for baskets especially in Silkstone.

The hanging baskets sponsorship has grown since its first year in 2016 when 15 baskets were sponsored. In 2017 there were 22 baskets and in 2018 there will be 26 with 11 of these being new sponsors.

Defibrillators and Summer Fair

During 2017 the Parish Council promoted fundraising for a defibrillator in each village. With support from local businesses, local groups and residents through donations, fundraising and the summer fair the fundraising meant that an application to the Yorkshire Ambulance Service (YAS) under their 999 scheme was accepted. The Parish raised £999 for each defibrillator and the YAS covered the extra cost for the cabinets. The income received in excess of the purchase cost will cover 4 years maintenance costs for both units. This was a fantastic achievement so thank you to everyone that donated, helped with fundraising and helped at the summer fair.

Awarded Grants

In the 17-18 financial year the Parish Council saw the installation of the new trim trail at Silkstone Recreation Ground with 100% grant funding from Tesco Bags of Help. Refurbishment works were completed on the war memorial in September 17 with a 75 % grant from the War Memorials Trust with the remaining cost met by the Parish Council.

CARE have been successful in securing funding for trees planted around the trim trail and for footpath improvement works to Conroyd Wood which will commence in July.

Bees and Butterflies

Wildlife gives life to gardens. Bees are essential pollinators of our flowers and food crops.

Despite this in recent years bee numbers in the UK have been declining. As Save Our Bees say "if our native bees die out we will lose a third of our diet." This is because bees play an essential part in pollinating the crops that form our food. In addition bees also pollinate the wild plants that grow that provide food for much of other wildlife.

Butterflies are a visual delight in any garden. Like bees they enjoy nectar-producing flowers and a sunny warm area.

How to attract bees and butterflies

 The best way of attracting them into your garden is to provide nectar and pollen rich flowers throughout the year. Butterflies are particularly fond of flowers in warm and sunny locations.

- 2. Provide water in a shallow plant saucer.
- 3. Avoid the use of pesticides and do not spray flowers that are in bloom. Pesticides kill bees and butterflies.
- **4.** Butterflies will feed on the juices of over-ripe fruit such as apples and pears.

Provide somewhere to stay!

- Provide nesting locations for bees. A bee house will attract some types, others nest in bare soil or under hedges.
- 6. A butterfly house will give them a place to stay in bad weather or to hide from predators.
