### **Cold Caller Vigilance**

### Damian Hunsley's Christmas Thai style fishcake starter recipe.

Christmas is nearly upon us again; believe it or not it's my favourite, but busiest time of the year.

At work, I started planning for Christmas, even before Halloween. Christmas cakes cooked, turkeys ordered, and stuffing balls are coming out of my ears.

I teach cookery at Wakefield College and we run Gaskell's training restaurant. Christmas bookings are a sell out and very popular, so popular that we produce the Christmas meals for five weeks. We offer a 5-course dinner, finished with homemade petit fours and mulled wine.

Here is something tasty and a little less traditional. A good dinner party starter, that's a simple dish to produce and has a nice spiced flavour.

### ingredients to make around 10 portions:

- 250g salmon filleted and skinned
- 250g cod filleted and skinned
- 1¼ tsp sesame oil, or olive oil
- 5 garlic cloves
- 2¼ tbsp root ginger, grated

- 1 red chilli (small)
- 1½ tsp soy sauce
- 1 zested lime
- 4 shredded spring onions
- A good pinch of salt and pepper
- 25ml Lime juice
- Sunflower oil for cooking

### **Preparation Method**

- Pass all the ingredients except the oil for cooking in a food processor, blend until bound together and smooth.
- 2. Turn out and divide into 20 cakes, approx. 2 cm thick.
- **3.** Pass through seasoned flour.
- **4.** Deep fry at 180c until golden brown. Or you can pan fry and finish off in the oven.
- Serve with Sweet Chilli dipping sauce. You could also add a small green salad, with spring onions and coriander.

Note. To extend the mixture and give you more portions add 250gm of mashed potato to the ingredients after processing.

### Winter Gardening with Emma Horsfield from the Nursery, Pot House Hamlet, Silkstone

Christmas time is fast approaching and there is always the problem of the present for someone that has everything. Why not make up an indoor arrangement of your very own. People are much more grateful, and dare I say impressed, with the knowledge of a present made with the care and attention of your own fair hands.

I remember as a "wee bairn" every Christmas making an arrangement for my Grandad and Grandma and my Granny and Grandpa. This was of course with the aid of my very talented father. My Grandparents always seemed to favour this present above all the others because their wonderful granddaughter (their words, not mine!) had taken the time and "got her hands mucky" to make it. Still to this day I make my parents an arrangement but I must add, on my own as I'm now "grown up".

So how does one set about making such a cherished present? It's very simple really. Firstly choose the container, basket, tub or pot, preferably with no holes in the bottom so as to not leak water. If there are any holes you'll need a saucer too. Secondly choose your plants. I always find a mixed basket works best, some flowering plants and some fol iage.

At Christmas, cyclamen, hyacinths, poinsettias and Christmas cacti all look good. There are so many foliage plants available but I favour the ferns, prayer plants, ficus and spider plants. The number of plants depends on the size of your container. To make an arrangement look best, the plants need to be fairly close together without large gaps.

Once the plants are chosen, put a little multipurpose compost and a hand full of bulb fibre in your container, start planting with the tallest plants first at the back of the container moving on to the smaller ones at the front and the sides. Remember the arrangement is 3 dimensional; therefore you may need some small plants to fill in gaps at the back or sides. Once all the plants are in their correct places fill in the gaps with some compost. I find a little horticultural grit on the top also helps with watering so compost does not splash everywhere. Then use a small watering can to water in between the plants, remember not to over water if there are no drainage holes in the bottom. To finish off, a strategically placed large bow, a candle, or a pinecone sprayed silver or gold can give that festive feel. Lastly, when giving the present, remember to wear a large smile and feel proud of yourself for your effort.



Treat yourself to a large glass of your favourite tipple, mine being red wine!

### **Reminders for Winter**

- Plant bare rooted roses and native whips
- Put nuts out for the birds
- Clear away dead leaves to prevent slugs from hibernating
- Protect any tender plants from frost with fleece, especially magnolia buds
- Prune and feed roses
- Thin out shrubs and prune to shape
- Prune clematis, wisteria and vitis
- Removing snow from some evergreens prevents broken branches
- Keep off a frozen lawn, the grass will die if crushed
- Tie in climbers to prevent breakage from wind
- Keep a football in the pond to prevent it from freezing over

### **English Oak Memorial Trees**

Following the commemorations marking the 100-year anniversary of the Armistice, one important consideration is "How do we ensure that there will be a reminder for future generations of the sacrifices during the Great War years and thereafter?"

We hope that by planting an English Oak (Quercus robur) tree in both villages, together with a memorial plaque, there will be a living reminder for generations to come. It will take about 40 years before acorns are produced and maybe another 100 years before there is a peak 'harvest' and up to 250 years until they start to die.



The plaques were kindly donated by 'Signs Xtra' with the wording intended to recognise the sacrifices not only of the brave service personnel but also the workers on the 'Home Front' such as munitions workers, coal miners, steel workers, railway workers etc. their collective families and the wider community who were all affected by the ravages of war and the aftermath.

Thanks to Bill Barkworth and Ian Calvert of the CARE group; the trees were planted in time for the commemoration – one tree can be found in Orchard Wood, Silkstone Common and the other in The Chestnuts, Silkstone. The plaques are to be mounted upon a stone plinth and should be in situ during the early part of 2019.

We do hope you and your families will enjoy the Oak trees and preserve them for the future – Lest we Forget.



### A message from South Yorkshire Police

### Changes To Lost Property Reporting - From 1 October 2018

From Monday 1 October 2018, South Yorkshire Police will no longer take reports or record lost property and will not issue lost property reference numbers. This is a national decision and with the exception of foreign ID documents (including passports), or items classed as 'dangerous' such as firearms, all police forces in England and Wales will no longer take reports of lost property.

We will instead be directing members of the public to

www.reportmyloss.com where for a small cost, they will be able to get a reference number for insurance purposes.

Lost property is not a police matter, so there is no legal requirement to report it to us or for the police to maintain a system of recording non-evidential property.

The decision to stop taking these reports will reduce demand on enquiry desk staff and our call handlers who take on average 11,000 reports per year, 4,000 of them over the phone. This will save more than 300 hours of staff time each year.

### Heroes of the Red Duster: The British Royal Merchant Navy

None of the Allied services engaged in World War II was in action longer or suffered a higher percentage of casualties than the British Merchant Navy.

The unsung heroes who plied the world's sea-lanes under the Red Ensign, nicknamed the "Red Duster," were on the front lines from beginning to end. Their war began less than nine hours after Great Britain and France declared war on Nazi Germany on September 3, 1939, following the invasion of Poland. A merchant navy man wrote the poem below from Liverpool, was on a ship that was torpedoed. He was picked up in a lifeboat, returned to shore and immediately sent back out to sea on another ship. The poem is a reflection of what he felt, when peace finally reigned.

It was just another day


Endlessly they would struggle Against waves day and night Hoping that every moment A vessel would come in sight





### **National Trust to Open Wentworth Castle Gardens**

The National Trust has announced that it will be taking a 25 year lease from Barnsley Council, to take over and reopen Wentworth Castle Gardens at Stainborough.

This is great news for the local area, and surely welcome to the many people in the parish who visited the gardens during the 'Stainborough Rhododendrons' weekends organised by Silkstone Church, and who volunteered at the gardens during their restoration.

The news that the National Trust will be taking over the gardens came just a few weeks ago. Plans are afoot to improve the facilities and the Trust expects to reopen in summer 2019.

It will be the National Trust's only property in South Yorkshire, and it's just around the corner – from Silkstone Common you can see the tower of Stainborough Castle romantically peeking through trees on the hill at Hood Green.



The beautiful gardens, follies, monuments and parkland at Stainborough were closed to the public for many years, until a major restoration saw over £20m spent on bringing the property back to life. Structures that were crumbling were mended, the splendid Victorian Conservatory disintegrating into rust was rescued and rebuilt, and the stunning Stainborough Castle folly was made safe. The Trust which oversaw the restoration of the gardens and opened them to the public was hit by a funding crisis and could not keep the gardens open, and gates closed in 2017.

The National Trust has a membership of 4 million, and we hope that, along with local support, this will ensure that the Gardens can be sustained at last and enjoyed again by many thousands of visitors.





### **Garden Birds in Winter**

### Your garden can save lives!!

Winter is a difficult time of year for birds, the days are short and the nights are cold, so they must eat a lot of food in a short amount of time to have the energy to survive until the morning.

In addition, food is harder to come by in winter. Insects are hibernating, grubs are buried deep in the ground and snow and ice make it harder to find food.

Finding a regular source of high-energy food such as a garden feeding station is the equivalent of winning the lottery for wild birds and a well-stocked garden is a real lifesaver.

If you provide food on a daily basis you will almost certainly notice more birds coming into your garden – particularly if you provide food on a regular basis.

### Water is important

Providing a fresh, ice-free supply of water is another cold weather essential - drinking and bathing is a vital part of the daily routine of birds.

### When they will visit most

There is usually a flurry of activity first thing in the morning – as they replenish energy lost overnight - and last thing in the afternoon - to prepare for the long night ahead.

# Some of the visitors you might see in your garden and what they eat

**Robins** mainly feed on small invertebrates, which they find in the soil.

**Blackbirds** will eat worms, spiders, fruit and seeds.

**Long-tailed tits** like other tits like insects and seeds.





**Greater spotted woodpeckers** like insects but will visit to eat suet, nuts and seeds.



Mistle thrushes are the UK's largest thrush and in early autumn they gather in large flocks to feed together. But as soon as holly berries appear, they will split off on their own or into pairs and get defensive. Each bird or pair will find itself a holly tree or bush teeming with berries and will set up a territory.

The berries on that tree won't be eaten, but will be guarded with such care that no other birds can take them either. Mistle thrushes are so good at protecting their trees, that by spring many will still have their full crop of berries untouched, long after any unprotected holly has had its fruit stripped.



### Share your dinner with the birds

Many kitchen scraps and leftovers make ideal snacks for birds visiting your garden and can help them get the food they need to survive. Here's a quick guide:

- Fat fat from cuts of meat (as long as it is unsalted) can be put out in large pieces, from which birds such as tits can remove morsels. Make sure that these are well anchored to prevent large birds flying away with the whole piece. Please remember cooked turkey fat from roasting tins is NOT suitable for birds.
- Roast potatoes cold and opened up, these will be eaten by most garden birds.
- Vegetables cold brussels, parsnips or carrots will be eaten by starlings and other birds, but remember not to put out more than will be eaten in one day, otherwise you run the risk of attracting rats.
- Fruit excess or bruised apples, pears and other fruit are very popular with all thrushes, tits and starlings. Cut them up and leave them on the bird table or on the ground.
- Pastry cooked or uncooked is excellent, especially if it has been made with real fats. Do NOT put out in spring as baby birds can't digest pastry.
- Cheese Hard bits of cheese are a favourite with robins, dunnocks, blackbirds and song thrushes. It will also help wrens if placed under hedgerows and other areas in your garden where you have noticed them feeding. Avoid feeding them very strong or blue cheeses.
- Dried fruits raisins, sultanas and currants are particularly enjoyed by blackbirds, song thrushes and robins.
- Biscuits and cake Stale cake and broken pieces of biscuits from the bottom of the tin are high in fat and ideal for birds in the winter.


