Silkstone Swifts

Silkstone Swifts netball club was initially set up to give youngsters in our Parish a taster of netball. Due to the nature of Netball, and the requirement for a full size indoor court to comply with England Netball regulations we sought a fairly local venue at Darton Academy.

Since the early days in the winter months, we have grown exponentially and now have over 80 kids registered at the training sessions. The need for more space and longer training sessions has meant that we now run from Honeywell Sports campus, Barnsley.

True to our name, we still have many girls from the local schools of Silkstone and Silkstone Common, and as a club we offer netball sessions at both schools to keep the passion going.



The initial few months have been a steep learning curve and has been far more time consuming than anticipated. We have an array of volunteers on the committee, each invaluable in their own way; but it does mean we can share the load. As you can imagine, 80 juniors over 4 hours can be incredibly fun, but certainly challenging.

We have several coaches with a wealth of experience involved at the club, and teams have now entered the South Yorkshire junior netball leagues. We hope in the coming

months, squads in each age group from U10's to U16's will be involved.

For the younger age groups, who are not quite ready for matches, we have established a reward program, whereby the girls are rewarded as they learn new netball skills and knowledge. They track their own progress each week and are rewarded with variety of things from Swifts bracelets to keyrings.



In the summer, we approached the Parish Council to assist with purchasing our new netball dresses ahead of the new season. We are incredibly grateful that they funded over 40 dresses for the youngsters. This has meant that the girls have a real sense of belonging once they step on court. In the past few months, many have stepped onto a court for the very first time. There is a definite sense of achievement to watch them grow from relative novices to playing as a team, and even winning matches!

We hope as a committee to continue promoting Netball across our region and enable more youngsters to fall in the love with this great sport.





Damian's festive fruity sausage stuffing

I have created a rich fruity festive stuffing that is great served up with the roast turkey or pork. You can even stuff chicken breasts with it, wrap them in bacon and bake them in the oven. I've tried to give the standard sage on onion stuffing a twist, but you can play around and add what you like. I used almonds in the recipe, but you could use chestnuts. You can add the extra fruit (sultanas) if like me, you like things a little fruity!

You could make this in advance and freeze it, so go on, have a go.

Ingredients:

- 150g bacon, chopped small
- 1 large onion, diced
- 100g brown breadcrumbs, simply grate some old, dry bread crusts
- 250g pork sausage meat –split open and de-skinned sausages are fine.
- Pinch dry thyme
- 60g dried apricots, chopped very small
- 75g almonds –but not essential
- 50g sultanas –but not essential
- 2 tbsp. chopped parsley
- 1 egg
- Salt and pepper

Method:

Gently fry the onions and bacon, until soft and then allow it to cool.

Tip the mixture into a bowl and add the sausage meat, parsley and thyme, chopped fruits and nuts. Add the bread crumbs and eggs (the binding ingredients) and now season. Mix until fully combined and either roll into balls and bake, to serve with your roast meats, or you stuff as required.

Note that if the mixture is a little wet, then add a little more breadcrumb.

Struggling with gambling issues?

Data from the NHS in Feb 2022 shows that the north of England has the highest prevalence of at-risk gamblers, with 4.4% of adults in the North West and 4.9% in the North East being at the most risk of addiction. Flowers for bees in winter

As our climate warms, some bee species (including the buff-tailed bumblebee) increasingly forage for food during winter. Make it easier for them by growing nectar-rich flowers such as heather, aconite, mahonia and snowdrops. Many nectar gems make great container plants to brighten the front door and can be planted out in the garden after flowering: for instance hellebores (Christmas Rose), which will continue to flower into spring.

Snowdrop



The common snowdrop provides vital nectar for bees at the end of winter. To encourage it to naturalise, enrich well-drained soil with leaf mould and plant in staggered groups in semishade or shade. H15cm.

Christmas Rose



The elegant white flowers of the Christmas rose provide nectar from January to March. Grow in well-drained soil in sheltered semi-shade. Remove the evergreen leaves in winter to show off the flowers and prevent disease. H40cm.

History on your door step

Heritage Silkstone was formed 12 years ago with the aim of promoting local, social, and family history. We have a resource centre within Silkstone Church, full of information about the parish of Silkstone, Silkstone families, maps, books and other resource material. We open the church to visitors every Wednesday 10am to 2pm.

All Saints Church is the oldest building in Silkstone and has seen both happy and sad occasions spanning the generations. The earliest documentary evidence relating to the church dates from 1090 when Swein, son of the Saxon Thane Ailric, gifted the church to the monks at Pontefract Priory.

All Saints Church is grade I listed and remaining elements of Norman architecture can be found within the church, namely the chancel arch piers and the arch between the chancel and St. James's chapel. The church was rebuilt in the late 12th century to a Norman cruciform layout, having a central tower over the nave and chancel crossing together with north and south transepts. In common with many Pennine churches in the area the church is built in the Perpendicular style (1350-1550). During this period the central tower was taken down and rebuilt at the west end of the nave. This work was completed in 1495.

Known as the 'Minister of the Moors' the church contains a late 15th century timber roof with numerous carved bosses and green men. The box pews date from the 1820's and many have the names of the owners on their doors. The Perpendicular rood screens, although altered over the centuries to fit the building, are one of the finest features of the church.

The original Norman chancel was virtually rebuilt in the 1850s and finished with a wooden hammer beam roof. Alas in doing so many of the Norman architectural features were lost forever.

Over the centuries Silkstone parish has been the home to many famous and infamous characters and their stories will be told in further editions of the parish newsletter.



Orchard Wood - planned improvements to access and pathway

Orchard Wood in Silkstone Common is a splendid place for residents and visitors to enjoy. Sadly, at present, access from Moorend Lane is not ideal and the path up to the top of the steps is collapsing and uneven.

We hope to improve the entrance from Moorend lane by cutting back vegetation and replacing the gate system so that push chairs can get through. We have already stated cutting back the vegetation, so we can assess what needs to be done.



The current footpath, as this photo shows, had collapsed in places and rather haphazard, it too needs improvement so it is not a trip hazard.

We have begun by removing the collapsing steps and smoothing them into shallow ramps.

We plan to put a more defined footpath in place with appropriate hard core (sympathetic to the woodland) to provide a clear walkway. That will also be easier to clear of leaves in Autumn so we don't get the build-up of leaves turning to mud which we experience at the moment.

The steps up the steep section have been in place for a long time and need a bit of TLC, we hope to repair and replace them as necessary.

The access from Woodland View up to the meadow gets very muddy, especially in winter and spring, when there is heavy rain. There is layer of hardcore which CARE put there many years ago. Now it is mainly hidden by overgrowth and mud. We hope to improve the drainage to divert the water and re-instate a defined path

with hard core so it is less of a slip and trip hazard in future.

How soon these improvements happen will be a combination of funding, weather and support from Twiggs.

A note about the bank next to the meadow

This is work in progress. As we are taking a non-weedkiller approach it will take a while to really inhibit the growth of brambles and couch grass. There are however a lot of new wildflowers growing, bulbs have been planted and the hedge is doing well. We plan to keep the hedge low so that people sitting on the seat still have a nice view.


As trees on and around the bank grow we need to take this into account for future development.



Insect of the Issue - Winter Gnat - Trichocera annulata

We don't expect to see many insects on the wing in winter, but just a little sunshine draws out swarms of tiny dancers. These are male winter gnats (Trichocera annulata and other Trichoceridae); delicate leggy flies

which are dancing to impress female gnats.

Winter gnats are around all year but are most noticeable in the colder months when the males perform their courtship dances. Swarms gather in areas that are kept warmer by the sun, such as woodland glades, riverbanks and above sun-warmed



objects. Sometimes they follow people purely for the heat they give off (though they resemble mosquitoes they do not bite). This act of gathering together to attract mates is known as "lekking" and is thought to make them easier for females to find. Each male flies up and down to his own rhythm. They are quick to scatter and re-join nearby.

These swarms attract predators too. Small birds snap up the flies for a much-needed protein snack.

The female lays her eggs amongst decaying vegetation, which the larvae feed on. When the adults emerge they are often attracted to electric lights and can be found on windows after entering houses. They do no harm indoors or out. Just relax and appreciate the dancing clouds.

Identifying animal footprints in the snow (or mud!)

- Claw marks and number of toes are key.
- **2.** Measure the length and width of several prints in a track.
- 3. Identify patterns is each mark identical or varying in shape and size, in a straight line or meandering? Are footprints close together or further apart?
- **4.** Look for other evidence to confirm your findings, such as droppings, fur or feathers, nests or noises.

Fox

Appearance: four toes - two at the front and one at each side - and a roughly oval-shaped pad at the rear. Claw marks may be visible at the end of each toe.



Size: around 5cm long, 4cm wide.

Could be confused with: dog tracks, but they can be told apart:

 Fox tracks tend to be narrower, with the toes closer together,

- giving it a diamond shape dog tracks are slightly rounder.
- Larger prints are likely to belong to a dog.
- Foxes tend to travel in straight lines, while dogs move around much more erratically.

Badger

Appearance: five toes above a broad rear pad. Claw marks may also be visible.

Size: 5cm long, up to 6.5cm wide.

Could be confused with: cat tracks,



but there are differences. Cat tracks only show four toes and no claw marks, as they retract their claws when walking. Cat pawprints are smaller too at around 3.5cm long and 4cm wide.

Rabbit

Rabbits are social creatures so you may see lots of their tracks crossing each other in the snow.

Appearance: a pair of long, thin




prints and a pair of shorter prints, as rabbits' hind feet are much larger than their fore feet. They have four pads on both fore and hind feet.

Size: front feet are around 3.5cm long, 2.5cm wide. Hind feet are more than twice as long, although rabbits don't place the whole of the back feet on the ground when they run.

Could be confused with: hares have similar prints but are much larger than rabbits, so stride length may be longer. Hares tend to live alone on open land, so if you're in woodland with multiple tracks, it's most likely the tracks belong to rabbits.


